In accordance with custom the Governments of the United States and Great Britain have united in presenting Mr. Delfosse, the Belgian Minister who acted on the Board of Arbitration in determining the fishery award under the Washington Treaty, with a silver dinner set, as a recognition of his services. The set is now at the State Department at Washington. It consists of a full dinner service, comprising sixty pieces, including eighteen soup-plates and eight salt cellars, trays, dishes for meats, vegetables and fruits, and has in addition all manner of spoons used at dinner, and fruit knives. One of the largest trays is the following inscription:

“Presented to Maurice Delfosse by the Governments of Great Britain and the United States in recognition of the public service rendered by him, at the request of the two Governments, as President of the Commission held at Halifax under the Fishery Articles of the Treaty at Washington.”

Affairs in the Lancashire cotton districts have assumed a very gloomy and threatening aspect. The meeting between employers and delegates of workers in twenty-five cotton making towns, was held lately in Manchester. The men presented their case strongly, and urged it with no little eloquence. They gave figures to show that at their present rate of wages, and with all possible economy, they were barely able to keep body and soul together, and were unable to lay aside anything. Employers, on the other hand, exhibited figures to show that they were now carrying on their business on a very narrow margin, and that the 5 per cent additional wages demanded by the men would absorb more than they were making. The discussion was protracted and warm, the men insisting that the figures of employers were misleading and fallacious. The masters finally told the men they would not grant the advance demanded, and also informed them that if the weavers did not withdraw their notices to strike they would lock them out. The news spread rapidly and causes much excitement. The situation is very strained and is regarded with much apprehension. Serious disturbances are feared and it is thought likely that the riots of last year will be repeated. At Preston hundreds of additional policemen are ordered, and the military have been instructed to hold themselves in readiness for any emergency.

MR. GLADSTONE'S Chief Secretary for Ireland, Mr. Forster, is an able man, not given to indulging in extremist views and purposes. He is a superior administrator and of conciliatory manners. But he succeeds to an inheritance badly encumbered and difficult to manage. His predecessor left him a legacy of famine, mitigated, but still dangerous. Mr. Forster has, in effect, received warning that the efforts of private benevolence are about exhausted, and that the Government will be looked to in the emergency to save the suffering people in their dire extremity. But it does not appear that Mr. Forster is to pursue a policy in the matter different in any essential respect from that adopted by his predecessor—the policy of loans in aid to the landlords, save that something may be done under Government supervision in the construction of fishery piers, which would serve a double purpose of furnishing immediate employment at certain points, and ultimately promote the fishing interests. However, it is to be earnestly hoped that the means relied on will prove adequate to the accomplishment of their intended purpose.
