## The Trades Are Coming

FOR THE next 11 days former stars and up-and-coming rookies will make their debut wearing the uniforms of the team down the drain in the major league's player draft.

June 15 will be the date when National and American League teams cut their rosters to the year's limit of 25 players. Until the 15th some road and some-not-so-good ball players are bound to change uniforms.

The National League St. Louis Cardinals were the first club to go to the leading batters. They sent former World Series MVP Stan Musial to Chicago Cubs for what they hope will be some badly needed relief pitching in 25-year-old Glen Hobbie. Cardinals also sent nine white while losing 13 last season. He hasn't done that well this year.
