## Borden Ferry Service Notches Record Year

BORDEN — Canadian National ferries operating between Cape Tormentine, N.B. and Borden, P.E.I. carried 672,688 passengers across the Northumberland Strait last year—comparable to nearly half the total population of the three Maritime Provinces and a 10 per cent increase over 1964.

J. G. Davis, manager of CNS Maritime area, said: "There are two major factors which contributed to the 66,462 increase. During 1965, more tourists visited the area and, with the most frequent ferry service ever for Prince Edward Island, Canadian National was able to meet their transportation requirements.

"An indication of this is the 328,494 passengers carried across Northumberland Strait during July and August," said Mr. Davis. "In July, we established a record in the number of passengers handled and the following month, it was replaced by another record."

During 1965, the ferries carried 285,778 vehicles—representing an increase of 28,218 over 1964.

ried 28,113 passengers between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and 11,836 vehicles. The totals represent increases of 4,441 persons and 2,165 vehicles over December, 1964. There were 2,049 passengers travelling via CN bus, a service not offered in December, 1964.

The vehicle totals include 8,663 automobiles, 1,901 trucks, 1,154 tractor trailers, 199 buses, one motorcycle and 16 passenger trailers.

**MADE 618 CROSSINGS**

The Abegweit and Prince Edward Island handled the traffic in 618 crossings—312 for the Abegweit and 306 for the Prince Edward Island.

Said Mr. Davis: "Last year was an extremely busy one in CNS marine services—particularly in carrying passengers. With the trend of increased travel by tourists and Canadians expected to continue into 1966, we are looking forward to another successful year."

## Phone Rates Reduced

Long distance telephone rates for Islanders calling to New Brunswick points have been reduced, the Island Telephone Company announced Saturday.

Walter Auld, Island company manager, said the reduction range as high as 25 cents a call for three-minute, daytime calls from, for example, Summerside to Newcastle, or Charlottetown to Saint John.

## SDU Graduates Shown Preference In Business

A growing interest in Saint Dunstan's University graduates as future employees is being shown by nation-wide business firms it was noted in figures released Saturday by Michael Hennessey, registrar at SDU.

Mr. Hennessey said that so far this year 12 firms have interviewed many of the graduating students in all faculties.

"Each representative has interviewed at least four or five students, some several more," he said. "Other firms will also be sending representatives to SDU within the next couple of months."

The SDU registrar said that more and more firms are visiting the campus for recruitment purposes each year. Some of the types of businesses include large retail outlets, banks, accounting firms, industrial firms and several branches of the federal civil service.

Because of the growing demand for graduates, he said, the university authorities thought it prudent some time ago to request the services of a full-time placement officer from the National Employment Service. It is anticipated that the position will be filled by an NES officer within the next few months.

## British Exports Up 7 Per Cent

LONDON (AP) — British exports rose seven per cent last year, an advance described Wednesday by the president of the Board of Trade as "impressive."

The rise was reported in the monthly trade statement released by Douglas Jay, board president. It showed exports also hit a record high in December.

The 1965 export rise was two percentage points above the average for recent years. Officials attributed it in some degree to the government's export drive.

The most impressive rise came in British exports to the United States—a record rise of 23 per cent to about \$200,000,000 (\$1,500,000,000). Much of this (\$1,500,000,000). Much of this was accounted for by sales of British fashions, pop records and other consumer items.

The December figures represent a trend government officials hope will cut last year's deficit by 50 per cent and wipe it out by the end of 1966.

In 1964 Britain ended the year about \$2,000,000,000 in the red and saved the pound sterling only by massive loans abroad. The December figures showed exports at £419,000,000, which is £1,000,000 above the July record. Re-exports boosted the December total to £436,000,000.
