ORE SHIPMENTS UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Iron ore shipments from Canadian mines in September reached a record 1,121,412 tons, up 41 per cent from September, 1953, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday. The increase followed a 27-per-cent gain in August to 922,271 tons from 732,860. But since shipments were down in all earlier months except January, the January-September shipment total was slightly lower at 4,699,829 tons compared with 4,868,132 in the equivalent 1953 period.
