OTTAWA (CP)—Production of margarine, shortening and refined cooking oils dropped in October from the corresponding month last year, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. October production of margarine dropped to 11,314,000 pounds from 11,717,000 last year, shortening output to 12,613,000 from 13,034,000 and refined cooking oils to 3,053,000 pounds from 3,092,000 in October, 1954.

Fire Destroys Dwelling At Alliston Yesterday

Fire early yesterday morning completely destroyed the home of Alexander MacSwain, Alliston corner, permitting Mr. and Mrs. MacSwain and their three children to escape with only the clothes they were wearing before the frame building became a ragging inferno. The fire is suspected to have started around the kitchen flue, and before it was noticed it was already bursting through the kitchen ceiling, Mr. and Mrs. MacSwain and the children barely made their escape when the upstairs burst in flames. The fire began about 3 a.m. and an hour later the building was all down on the ground, with very little having been saved from the house.

Although a large crowd gathered they were unable to do anything owing to the fast progress of the fire. A few articles of furniture were removed.

House and barns owned by Ellis MacPherson directly to the east was in a direct line of flying sparks which for some time endangered his house. A considerable number of volunteers stood in readiness there to prevent any further disaster.

It is understood that there was very little insurance on the MacSwain residence. The family at the present time are staying with Mrs. MacSwain's sister at Peters Road
