Death In Hospital Sunday After Brief Illness of Mr. J. J. Larabee

The death occurred after a short illness in the Prince Edward Island Hospital of Mr. James J. Larabee, regional fisheries protection officer for Prince Edward Island in his 68th year. He was seized with a heart attack on Saturday and passed away yesterday.

Born in Eldon, P.E.I. Mr. Larabee early in life became associated with his father in a blacksmith trade. The young man applied himself industriously and some years later went into the retail business. From a modest beginning he became one of the largest produce shippers on the island.

In 1927 he was nominated to represent the Liberal party in the provincial election and was successful in obtaining his seat in the Legislature. He was again elected in 1931 and in 1935 switched to Federal politics and carried the Queens County seat for the Liberals in the House of Commons. He did not, however, sit in Parliament at Ottawa because of his resignation in favor of Charles A. Dunning who later represented Prince Edward Island in the Dominion Cabinet as Minister of Finance.

In the same year Mr. Larabee accepted the position of chief supervisor of fisheries in the province. During his period of service he saw the staff of P. E. I. Fisheries increase from five to 20 of the present day. The Department today also uses six government-owned boats as well as six chartered boats.

Pravda Gives Churchill Blast Over Prime Minister's Latest Disclosures

MOSCOW (AP)—Some Western observers here have raised the question whether Prime Minister Churchill has talked himself right out of the kind of Big Four conference he has been advocating for a year or more.

The prime minister in a speech last week disclosed that in 1945 he had ordered surrendered German arms to be stacked ready for reissue to captured German soldiers in case they were needed against Russian armies advancing across Western Europe.

Some observers in Moscow are wondering whether any Soviet leader now would sit down with Churchill who has been accused by Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, of committing "treachery" against the Red Army and of practicing "hypocrisy" against the Soviet Union.

LIKENED TO HESS
These questions arose Sunday as the Moscow radio's home service repeated at length Pravda's bitter three-column article which likened Churchill to Rudolph Hess, Hitler's wartime deputy. Pravda said Hess, who parachuted into a Scottish moor in the midst of the war, was on a mission of allying Germany and Britain against the Russians.

Pravda printed alongside its article Soviet documents recalling that during the 1944 Battle of the Bulge in the west, Churchill had appealed to Stalin for a massive Red army offensive and said Stalin obliged, thus diverting German strength to the eastern front.

Other points in Pravda's charges of treachery were considered significant here.

CALLING DUPLICITY
