ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: Sir Wilfrid Laurier's announcement that we can do without more railways into the Yukon until the boundary question is settled is a new justification of those who opposed last year's Yukon deal.

It stands to reason that if we do not need the railways now we did not need them a year ago.

Certainly it was folly in 1898 to offer 3,750,000 acres of our best gold land for roads that would build up United States coast towns, if it is wrong in 1899 to permit such roads to be built at no cost to our country.

The opposition to the Yukon transaction was justified, and while praising Sir Wilfrid for acknowledging it, the country ought also to be grateful to those who helped to thwart that unwise proposition.

The Mail and Empire remarks that upon the Yukon deal of the last session of Parliament the decision of the Government to charter no more railways into the gold region until the boundary question is settled is an extraordinary commentary from an unexpected source. The contract which the Ministers pushed with unparalleled zeal in 1898 provided for the construction of two roads. One commenced in undisputed Canadian territory, but was to be reached only through the Stickeen river and by way of Wrangel, which is a United States port. The other was to start from some point on the Lynn canal—in all probability Pyramid harbor. There can be no question that the Stickeen line, if at all serviceable, would have built up Wrangel, for everything would have been transhipped there to river boats. On the other hand the Lynn canal line would have created a town or territory in dispute, whereas Sir Wilfrid Laurier now says a new town—seeing that we are not certain that it may not turn out to be American—ought not to be encouraged.

NEWS NOTES.

During May, 52,400 tons of shipping was launched on the Clyde, a considerable increase over the figures for May, 1898. New contracts for 77,900 tons were made during May.

God save the Queen.

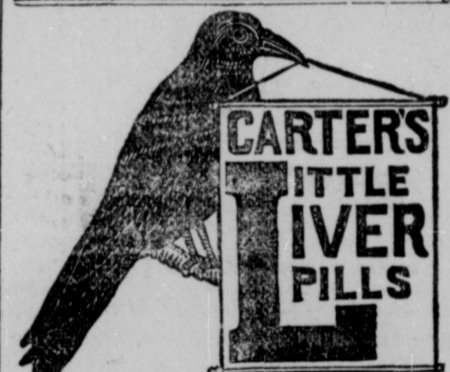
