"What Is It That Makes A Trophy Valuable?"

One of Summerside's boys has made quite a name for himself in Canadian football in Nova Scotia. Don Nicholson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ewen Nicholson, Summer Street, won the distinction of "top rookie" in the Canadian football in a poll conducted at Halifax, Don, who is a medical student at Dalhousie University, won over his nearest rival by a wide margin. Young Nicholson had made quite a reputation at Mount Allison University in English rugby, and seems destined to go on to greater fame in the Canadian game. We had been hearing regularly of Don's brilliant exploits on the gridiron, but figured the build-up might have been the result of over-exuberant enthusiasm on the part of Nick's room-mate. But apparently exaggeration was kept at a minimum, and Don is every bit as good as he was cracked up to be.

What is it that makes a trophy valuable? Is it the silver ornament that makes it sparkle in the sun? Is it the large cup that permits a considerable amount of champagne to be held ready for spilling? These things have some little value perhaps. But the champagne is passed around only during the victory celebration. The sparkle and glitter of the trophy provides mementary but not lasting pleasure. True, a thing of beauty is a joy forever, but these trophies are nearly always put away in mothballs after the first few weeks after the victory, and is not seen until it is played for again. No, the real value of a trophy seems to be the fact that it is a symbol of victory, that it stands for the successful culmination of a mighty struggle for supremacy.

We might steal the bell emblematic of the world's champion fighter from Marcellino, and what would it get us. We'd be a laughing-stock if we paraded it in front of the public. So holding a trophy that does not really belong to a football team seems a pretty silly business. Just what satisfaction this McInnis of Glace Bay can get out of keeping a trophy his team has not won is a mystery, unless he's using it to carry water from the well. Apparently he's setting himself up as a dictator of the sport of rugby in the Maritimes. He rules that Saint John did not get a square deal in playing with Acadia, and in, and behind this autocrat of the gridiron decided to give Saint John another chance.

DETROIT (CP) — Dutch Reibel and Red Kelly cashed third period goals as the Detroit Red Wings came from behind for a 3-2 victory that snapped the pace setting Montreal Canadiens unbeaten streak at 11 in a row.

Captain Ted Lindsay paced the rollicking Detroiters, who showed some of their former spark for the first time this season. He scored the opening goal and assisted on the other two as the seven-time National Hockey League champions produced a rare triumph.

It was only the fourth defeat for Montreal in its 22 games this season and ended a non-losing streak which had been going for four weeks. It was Detroit's fifth victory in 21 games.

Eskimo Coach Runs Players Through Final Workout

VICTORIA (CP)—Coach Frank (Pop) Ivy ran his Edmonton Eskimos through their final workout Thursday, then retired with his assistants to decide what players will be cut from the 32-member roster before the Grey Cup football final Saturday afternoon.

The task is no simple one for Ivy, who must include two of his American imports among the four men who will be chopped to get within the 28-player maximum for the game against Montreal Alouettes.

Ivy has 12 imports, the number allowed during the Western Interprovincial Football Union season, but in the Grey Cup game may dress only 10, the number the eastern Big Four has used all season.

 Who will be cut? Ivy said his decision won't be announced until the last minute—probably about half an hour before the game starts at Empire Stadium in Vancouver Saturday.

Thursday's workout was the last before Eskimos fly to Vancouver shortly after lunch today to await the opening kickoff. Ivy said he will send the players through a light run this afternoon to loosen up any kinks after the plane ride.

Ivy's cutting problem may be partially solved for him. All-star centre and linebacker Kurt Burris, Oklahoma ace in his freshman year with the defending Grey Cup champions, has an injured knee.

Burris has been running a little, trying to get the knee in shape for the game, but Ivy said it is doubtful he will be ready in time.

Heavy Rain Greeted Grey Cup Visitors In Vancouver

VANCOUVER (CP)—Grey Cup visitors poured into Vancouver Thursday while the rain poured down.

The weather forecaster predicted that the present disturbance will pass forward and another will hit the coastline, bringing drier air before game time Saturday afternoon.

In a special forecast for the football classic between Edmonton Eskimos and Montreal Alouettes, who arrived here Thursday after an overnight delay at Winnipeg, the weather office said the game-time picture should be: Cloudy and mild with little precipitation and a temperature of about 45 degrees.

VANCOUVER OPENS UP
 The wet weather hasn't hampered the spirits of football-crazy Vancouverites and the visitors who are arriving in droves by plane, train, car and boat.

The pre-game entertainment is rolling along in hotels, on the streets—everywhere.

Downtown lamp posts, store windows and streets were decked out in Grey Cup slogans, welcome signs and Christmas decorations, giving a festive air to the city.

Fans wearing the green and gold colors of the Eskimos and the red and white of the Alouettes could be seen everywhere in increasing numbers. An estimated 5,000 persons arrived Thursday from outside points.

O'Brien Drives Scott Frost To Another Victory

INGLEWOOD, Calif., (AP)—Three-year-old Scott Frost, driven by Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. I., added the \$75,000 American Trotting Classic Thursday to his year of sensational achievements.

The son of Hot Moa out of Nora clicked off a fast 1:59.8 mile, going practically wire to wire with Darn Safe.

Scott Frost, a 3 to 5 favorite, won \$31,641 for owner Saul Camp to go with the \$154,250 already pocketed for 22 previous wins, two seconds and one third this season—the most any standard-bred horse has made in a year.

Darn Safe's second money was \$11,641. He had a fifth and two straight seconds previously in the Classic. Lady Dunn was third, for \$3,291, having finished tenth and fourth previously.

Scott Frost paid \$3.40, \$2.40 and \$2.30; Darn Safe \$2.60 and \$2.40, and Lady Dunn \$3.90.
