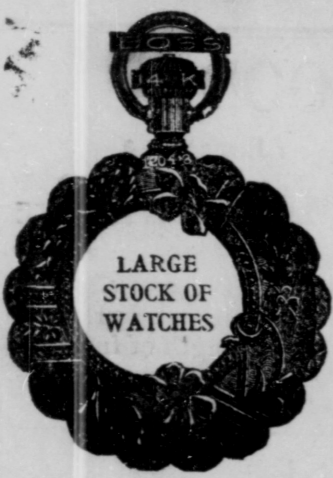

MISSION WORK.

Meeting of the N. B. and P. E. I. Missionary Society.

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick and P. E. I. branch of the Women's Missionary Society was opened in the Methodist church at Woodstock, N. B. Wednesday, Sept 26th.

The roll call was responded to by sixty delegates from various parts of New Brunswick and P. E. I.

Most of the morning session was occupied with minutes of the organizers' conference held on the previous afternoon, as well as suggestions as to plans of work. An excellent paper on "The Silent Member," written by Miss Durant, of P. E. I., was read.

The afternoon session was opened by devotional exercises led by Miss Strong of P. E. I. Island. Committee work was done and district organizers' reports given. The corresponding secretary's report was read, showing the total membership of auxiliaries and boards to be 3454. The treasurer's report showed \$5,476.44 raised, an increase of \$82.75 over last year.

The public anniversary meeting on the same evening was attended by a large, representative and appreciative audience. Mrs. J. D. Chipman, of St. Stephen, presiding. Rev. Mr. Marr, the pastor of the church, gave an address of welcome to the delegates. A greeting from the W. C. T. U. was responded to by Mrs. Cliff, of Fredericton. Mrs. Fisher, of Fredericton, sang a solo in a beautiful manner.

Mrs. Chipman gave the president's address, which dealt ably with the needs and progress of the work. A solo by Miss Thomas was well rendered. The corresponding secretary, Miss Palmer, gave her own and the treasurer's report. A male quartette followed, which gave great pleasure.

Miss Scott, of Toronto, made a most forceful and eloquent appeal in behalf of her work, urging the young women of the church to turn their attention to nobler things.

Russia Proposes Blockade.

ST. PETER-BURG, Sept. 27.—The Russian naval staff announces that it is proposed to blockade all Chinese naval ports in consequence of the hostile attitude of the Chinese fleet at Shanghai, and to send fast cruisers from the allied squadrons to protect the transports. The general staff announces that Russian troops are massing around Kirin, in Manchuria, where there are 5,000 Chinese.

WATER SYSTEM FOR PICTOU.—A water works system for Pictou is now assured. After several unsuccessful attempts to get a supply of water the efforts of the new promoters are being crowned with success. A test is now being made resulting in 500,000 gallons a day being pumped, and a million is obtainable. In fact there is no limit to the supply. Pictou will soon have an up-to-date system in operation and be in line with other progressive towns which will be beneficial to manufacturers locating there and a protection in case of fire. The promoters are to be congratulated on their success.
