**Charles Moffatt Attends Meeting**

Charles Moffatt, general manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, recently attended a meeting in Quebec honoring the Atlantic Corridor Road Committee for their effective work in promoting the highway through Maine to provide a short route between the Atlantic provinces and Central Canada.

Mr. Moffatt reports that enthusiasm at the meeting was high and that preparation of a Corridor Road brochure is well advanced. The brochure will be distributed to tourists and others during the summer.

**ISSUES STATEMENT**  
Premier Walter R. Shaw has issued the following statement on the proposed road:

"To an Island Province like Prince Edward Island, transportation has a way of becoming the most critical and vital problem and one on which our whole economy depends. Our hopes rise or fall depending upon the transportation outlook at any given time.

"We regard the proposed Corridor Road as something that offers great possibilities in that anything which serves to bring us closer to our New England and Central Canadian Markets can make a difference in our economic picture. Our main concern has always been getting our farm, fishery, and manufactured products to market as rapidly as possible.

"Even though we are a small province, we import a great deal from the outside and the Corridor Road would be of benefit to those who are selling and shipping to us.

"We support, wholeheartedly, this concept of building a Corridor Road to link the Maritime Provinces and New England States with our Central Canadian area."

**Five Professors Added To Staff**

The addition of five new professors from outside the province to teach at this year's summer session at St. Dunstan's University was announced last night by SDU summer school director, Rev. V.G. Murnaghan.

They will join with several members of the present SDU faculty to make up the summer school staff.

The newcomers will be Ralph J. Erickson, MA (Minnesota), EdD (Illinois), who will teach in the education department; Michael Carrol, MA (Notre Dame), in English; Murray Palmer, MA (Pennsylvania), in history; Leonard O'Hanley, MA (Gonzaga), and Ronald Lane, MA (New Mexico), both in philosophy.

**EIGHT COURSES**  
At the same time, Rr. Murnaghan, who is also Dean of Studies at SDU, announced that eight full-credit courses and five half-credit courses will be offered during the summer session which will run from July 4 to August 13.

Full-credit courses will be offered in Chemistry 1 (General Chemistry); Economics 4 (Labour Management-Relations); Education 5 (Psychological and Educational Measurements and Principles of Guidance); English 2 (Chaucer, Spencer, general introduction to Elizabethan theatre, Shakespeare, Bacon, Donne, Milton, Swift, Pope); English 3 (Eighteenth Century and Romantic Literature); History 4 (Modern European History); Philosophy 3 (Ethics and Rational Psychology); and Fine Arts (a survey history of architecture painting and sculpture from the Greek to contemporary times).

Half-credit offerings will be the first half of History 1 (Canadian History); Philosophy 1 (Logic); and Sociology 2 (The Political Institution); and the second half of Education 4 (Modern Philosophies of Education); and Sociology 1 (Introductory Sociology).

Registration for summer school students will be held on Thursday, June 30, from 10 to 12 a.m. and from 3 to 5 p.m. in Kelley Memorial Library at SDU.

Summer school calendars are available from the registrar at SDU.

**Lobster Outlook Is Bright With A Few Dark Spots**

Sunday, May 1, marks the opening of the lobster fishing season on the entire north shore of P.E.I. and the south and eastern shores of Kings and Queens counties. The weather and last year's good prices have made the outlook bright for most Island fishermen, but there are a few dark clouds on the horizon.

A heavy backlog of lobsters from last year makes it almost certain that prices this year will be considerably lower. And in district 8, the area where catches were disastrously low last year in many usually-reliable lobster trapping spots, there is no way to tell if the catch will increase this year until the traps are actually set and hauled in.

Ambrose P. Fitzgerald, chief of the Federal Department of Fisheries Protection Service in the Maritimes, announced that lobster boats have been permitted to leave the shore for trapping operations at eight a.m. this morning. We warned, however, that any boat leaving the shore with lobster fishing gear aboard before the appointed hour of eight — 9 o'clock will be seized and held until the case can come before a court.

Last year fishermen got their traps and lines out only to have ice come in and cause the loss of a great deal of valuable gear. High prices made up for the early losses, however, and most fishermen had average or better seasons, except for those in district 8.

This year there is no ice in sight, but cold weather in recent days has caused burst engine blocks in several fishing boats

and Graham's Lobster Packing Plant at Murray Harbor North had burst pipes. Last year there were approximately 292 boats out in the area from Annandale to Wood Islands, and this is expected to increase by five per cent this year. The limit on number of boats and traps per boat put into force in district 8. The idea is that fishermen are getting extra boats and their sons into the fishing before the limit, if it comes into effect in the area, can keep them out of hired men.



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
