Cuban Refugees Unite In 'Very Bad' Claims

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - "My Mal," said the thin old Cuban refugee, fingering his American papers with the care he gives his rosary.

"My Mal" said the school girl and the housewife and the banker and the cab driver and the retired old sea captain and the mechanic and the truck driver and the cousin of the president of Cuba, all of them speaking of life today in the sixth year of Premier Fidel Castro's revolution.

"Very bad" is the way they invariably begin, these newest Cuban refugees who left their island with Castro's permission. And consistently they paint the same picture of grim drab life under a state that riles up terror and neighborhood spies, where children are encouraged to inform on their parents and people speak little and cautiously in public.

They talk of a land where government men periodically show up in the classrooms and run the children through their Communist catechisms and inspect their notebooks to make certain they are being properly indoctrinated; where the economy is wrecked, the services disorganized and the old cars roll off the road and die for lack of parts.

FOOD RATIONED

They speak of a land where virtually all food is rationed and the average Cuban seldom gets the halfpound of meat a week he has been promised; where the streets are deserted and many houses need paint and the television is dreary with heavy-handed propaganda; where half the churches are closed and more than half the stores are shut down for lack of goods and the night clubs and the big hotels are virtually empty except for Russian technicians and other Marxist visitors living on the government arm.

This is the picture the refugees paint of life in Cuba. How many brush-strokes are color-dyed by personal prejudices, how many glimpses are seen through a mirror distorted by personal tragedy are matters of conjecture.

The refugees emerging now from Cuba most frequently are old pensioners or children or sick people. Few in the 15-to-27 age group, the primary military age, are being released. Vocationally, the new exiles include no doctors, few engineers or other technically trained people.

"In other words," said a U.S. state department official, "Castro so far seems to be letting out the people he doesn't need - the elderly, the unskilled, the dissidents, the ill, the people he no longer has to provide with scarce housing, food, medical supplies or pensions."

"I'm getting quite a kick out of this," Marx said. "My things will be in pretty high-class company, next to the Gettysburg address and the Declaration of Independence."

The universities of Wisconsin and Michigan also asked for his papers, said the mustached, cigar-wiggling star.

A selection of letters to and from Groucho will be published by Simon and Schuster within a year, he said.

The New York Times quotes Marx as saying that M. Lincoln Schuster, "who must be a trusting soul, has offered me a \$10,000 advance."

Miss Ann Hilker, information officer of the library of Congress, explained that along with letters of the presidents and of literary figures the library has a collection of papers of theatre and film people. Among these were listed Richard M. Mansfield, Charlotte Cushman, William S. Hart, Minnie Maddern Fiske and May Robson.

French Stores Reject Offer Of Arctic Site

QUEBEC (CP) - Rene Levesque, Quebec welfare and resources minister, says he tried to persuade a French-Canadian-owned department store to set up operations in the Quebec Arctic but "we finally had to hand everything over to the Hudson's Bay Company."

Mr. Levesque told the annual meeting of the Federation of Co-operative Stores here that Montreal and Quebec City enterprises had both requested the Metagami Que. trade.

The Hudson's Bay Company was accepted reluctantly because it has "integrated systematic exploitation and has systematically administered 'polar'."

The minister, who as resources minister has long advocated the transfer of jurisdiction over Quebec Eskimos to Quebec from Ottawa, said the whites who deal with Eskimos at present are encouraging Eskimo resistance to provincial jurisdiction.

"The only thing the Hudson's Bay and a part of the administration up there has built is a sustained anti-Quebec sentiment."

The Quebec government had attempted to counter Eskimo resistance by providing such services as the Quebec Provincial Police and grade schooling and by studying Eskimo culture.

Mr. Levesque urged the participants in the northern co-op movement to insist that co-operative stores be installed at Puitnik, an extreme northern point in the Quebec Arctic where an asbestos mine is being developed.

Liberal Leader In Ont. Faces Four Charges

PETERBOROUGH, Ont. (CP) Andrew Thompson, Ontario Liberal party leader, has been charged with four charges until following a two-car collision here Oct. 6 in which four persons were injured.

He is charged with dangerous driving, impaired driving, careless driving and failure to yield one-half of the road. He is free on \$100 bail.

Four women, occupants in the second car, required hospital treatment.
