THE MAGICIENNE.—H. M. S. Magicienne, one of the new cruisers built for the navy three years ago, has arrived at St. John, N. B. She is a twin screw steel cruiser of 2,950 tons, carrying 6 large guns, 13 quick firing guns, 6 machine guns and 4 torpedo tubes, and is commanded by Capt. Pipon, C. M. G.

STORM IN MANITOBA.—A despatch from Winnipeg says that a terrific storm swept over Manitoba on Sunday night. In several districts everything in its path was destroyed, buildings having been blown down, machinery demolished and barns smashed to fragments. One person was killed and many injured.

MAY QUEEN.—Capt. Paoli's steam tug May Queen made her trial trip yesterday evening, and as she sped up and down the river was greatly admired by crowds of people on the wharves. Capt. Paoli was well pleased with the manner in which she acted. It is the general opinion that she will prove herself to be the fastest boat in the harbor.

LARGE COAL OUTPUT.—The International Coal Company raised from their pit, in ordinary working hours on Saturday last, without any addition to the regular staff, 1,425 tons of coal. This believed to overtop anything yet accomplished in coal raising in this province. They shipped from their pier on the same day 2,700 tons.

DROWNED.—A very sad accident took place on Tuesday last up the St. John River at Welsford. While the Misses Russell, daughters of Mr. John Russell, who resides on Peter Street, were in bathing, it is supposed that they got beyond their depth and were drowned. At the time of going to press, no further particulars had been received. A later despatch says that the girls drowned were Dolie Russell and Alice Dennison.

A GENEROUS GRANT.—A special meeting of the St. John, N. B. City Council was held on Tuesday afternoon to deal with the question of affording relief to the sufferers by the St. John's, N.B., fire. The Mayor presided, and after the moving of several resolutions that different amounts be granted, the sum of \$6,000 was finally agreed upon, and a motion was carried in favor of that amount being transmitted.

PICNIC.—Quite a number of people from town attended the picnic given by the Hillsborough Boating Club at West River yesterday. Several hundred people from the adjoining districts were also in attendance. The picnic and different amusements were well patronized. The boat races in the afternoon were witnessed by a big crowd. Though not of an exciting character, they were well contested. Good order prevailed throughout the day. The Southport left on return shortly after seven, and after a pleasant sail reached the city about half past eight.

THE WRECKED THERESA.—Capt. B. G. Melvin, the only one saved off the American three-masted schooner Theresa, which was towed to Halifax waterlogged and on her beam ends, was the principal owner of the vessel. His interest is insured for \$15,000. There is no other insurance on the vessel or freight. The five men who were lost were shipped here last May, and their names are as follows: Charles Jesty, 38 years, mate, of Sydney, C. B.; Charles Frost, 30 years, cook and steward, of Germany; A. Fagerland, 19 years, able seaman, of Finland; John Downer, 23 years, able seaman, of P. E. Island; and Charles Barnes, 18 years, ordinary seaman, of London.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Liberal Gain Forty-Nine.

LONDON, July 14.

Mr. Gladstone's correct majority in the election is 673 reduced from 4,831. The returns officially announced up to 2 a.m. show the election of 268 supporters of the Government, and combined opposition of 265. The Liberal net gain of seats so far is 49. T. P. Healy, anti Parnellite, has been elected by a majority of 4864. Wm. Redmond Parnellite, has been elected by a majority of 446. A member of the Liberal Committee says that the Liberals now have an assured majority of at least 55.

Poisoned by Fly Paper.

BEVERLY, Mass., July 14.

The infant son of Franklin F. Wilkin, drank some water which had been poisoned by fly paper, and died four hours afterwards in excruciating agony. The fly paper contained enough arsenic to kill twelve persons.

News Notes.

With a view of securing direct communication with New York, a line will be constructed by the C. P. R. from Woodstock to Niagara Falls and the right of way will be obtained over one of the American lines to New York. The company will also construct a bridge over the channel between the present Cantilever and Suspension bridges. The bridge will be a single steel span, 1,200 feet in length, and the end will rest on either bank.

The construction of the world's longest railroad is progressing rapidly along the river valleys and across the steppes of Siberia. The western extremity of the road is the mining town of Miask, on the eastern side of the Ural range, and its eastern terminus is at Vladivostok, on the Sea of Japan, making a total length of 4,785 miles, which is nearly twice the length of the Canadian Pacific. It will cost \$183,850,000.—Merchants and Manufacturers.

The Catholic Missions in the vicinity of Porto Nova, the French settlement on the Right of Benin, are reported to have been destroyed on June 2 by the Dahomians. It is said six missionaries and three nuns were burned alive by their captors. Commander Rion, of the French forces, has been slightly wounded in pursuing the Dahomians.

The delay in the appointing of a French Behring Sea arbitrator is due to Foreign Minister Ribot's objection to English as the official language of the conference. M. Ribot contended that French is the official language on such an occasion. The United States legation sent a cablegram to Washington on the subject and finally a compromise was arranged. The protocols will be kept in English and French, and while French may be the official language of the conference, the decision of the conference will be given in English.

A portrait of Columbus and a view of the main building of the Columbian Exhibition at Chicago will mark the two sides of the souvenir coin which is provided for by the World's Fair Bill which is pending in the two Houses of Congress. The management of the fair has sent Director Leach a portrait, but it is a full face view, and he has written that they must have a profile view to meet the conditions of a suitable coin and prevent abrasions. He does not presume to choose among the several hundred portraits of Columbus, greatly differing among themselves, which is the most authentic one, but desires the management to select one, with the sole condition that it shall be profile.
