Vocational Loan Plan, Scholarships Available

Annual scholarships, bursaries and loans will be made available by the provincial government to vocational school students in the province and Island students taking the diploma course at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Truro, N.S.

In a joint announcement yesterday, Education Minister Dr. George Dewar and Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said the government has created the Centennial Vocational Scholarship and Bursary Loan Fund and the fund will be operating in time for the 1964-65 school year.

Dr. Dewar said the financial assistance program, approved at a meeting of the cabinet yesterday, was set up "in view of the need for funds by vocational students and in view of the fact that the Canada Student Loan Fund, which goes into operation this year, does not apply to vocational school students."

The assistance program has been divided into three phases.

COTTON FUND
Phase one is known as the Robert L. Cotton Scholarship Fund from which scholarships will be available to "students of highest academic attainment taking vocational training in the province, or agriculture at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College."

Dr. Dewar said that amounts of the scholarships have not yet been determined but he said that the program by Robert L. Cotton for provision of vocational training.

Phase two of the program is known as the bursary fund. Each year, 40 bursaries of \$150 each will be awarded vocational students of high academic attainment. The bursaries will also be available for diploma students at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

This bursary fund will be paid initially from the consolidated revenue of the province, according to Dr. Dewar.

STUDENT LOANS
The third phase of the assistance program will enable vocational students and diploma agricultural students to borrow up to \$200 per year for their education. The loans will be repayable by the student over a five-year period after the student graduates or completes his apprenticeship training. Dr. Dewar said the loans will also be available to persons taking

Miscouche Convent Is Site Of Centennial Celebrations

THE TWO oldest still living former pupils of Miscouche Convent were guests at the convent on Monday night as the sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame at the Convent celebrated their centennial of the Convent which was founded in September, 1864.

During the afternoon the former students of the convent registered at the convent and a social party was held.

At 5 p.m. a Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by Most Rev. Malcolm MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown. The sermon for the special service was given by Rev. Joseph LeClair, pastor of St. Rustic. The choir for the occasion was formed by the former pupils of the school.

At 7 p.m. a Centennial Banquet was held at the Miscouche Regional High School auditorium with guest speaker being Rev. Gerald Steele, pastor of Alberton.

SUPERIOR GENERAL HERE
Attending the Miscouche convent during the celebrations is Rev. Mother St. Helena-Du Sacre-Coeur, superior general of the Congregation of Notre Dame who attended ceremonies in honor of the two oldest living pupils of Notre Dame Monday night and who was present yesterday.

On September 9, 1864 the first sisters of the congregation of Notre Dame took up their abode at Miscouche on a journey from Montreal.

The convent is still the original building with the exception of a new wing which was added in 1922. A two-story school was built in 1952 and six years later with the addition of four more new classrooms, this became the high school. In 1963 the new Regional High School was completed.

The Miscouche convent is proud of the 100 years of working in the community of Miscouche and the work it has done in the field of education there. It feels it is a part of the spirit of the Fathers of Confederation.

Seven Fined In Traffic Court

Seven persons were each fined \$10 (nine with costs) for a variety of offences yesterday when they appeared before Justice of the Peace Albert Dineen in traffic court.

Impaired Driver Fined \$125

Magistrate A.J. Haslam, C.C. fined Peter J. Vasey, West Royalty, \$125 and costs or 90 days on an impaired driving charge in city police court yesterday.

Howard Joseph O'Brien of no fixed address pleaded guilty to a charge of that and was remanded to Aug. 21.

Also remanded to Aug. 21 was one man charged with being drunk and incapable, and another was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failure to stop at a red light.

Miscouche, Kinkora Water Safety Results

Results of the Canadian Red Cross Water Safety training program have been announced for two communities in Prince County. The communities are Miscouche and Kinkora.

The six weeks course started July 2, with Marilyn MacLennan, Red Cross supervisor for Prince County in charge.

Chairman at Kinkora was Mrs. Wallace McKenna, and instructors were Lyle Perley and Michael Picard. Chairman at Miscouche was Mrs. Huguette Vessey. Instructors were David Johnston and Daniel McNeill.

There was a total enrollment of 183 swimmers, 100 of whom were 175 tested, 76 passed, including 35 beginners.

The water safety training program was held in 33 communities in Prince County.

Potato Blight Retarded By Weather

Weather conditions on Prince Edward Island have continued to retard late blight disease. However, there are, scattered throughout the province, fields in which trace infections are present. These could quickly develop into local epidemics if the period of moist weather moves in. In the O'Leary district severe defoliation has already occurred in one field.

The weather is usually favorable to the blight fungus in late August and early September, this part of the season comes heavily characterized by heavy dews, ground fogs, and high humidity. During this period, sprays become increasingly important.

The disease has recently shown increased activity in Nova Scotia, particularly in regions where fogs have been common. Growers in the Truro area should be especially attentive to the health of their plantings.

Potato insects have not generally been a serious problem this year and they are expected to be for the remainder of the growing period.

Americans To Participate In '67 Fair

Provincial planning officer Walter de Silva, an advisory consultant on architectural planning for the 1967 Montreal World Fair, said the United States has accepted Canada's invitation to participate in the fair.
