Blasts Tariff Boost On UK Woollen Goods

TORONTO (CP)—Joseph Balcon, former United Kingdom trade commissioner in Toronto, said Wednesday the 10 to 20-per cent increase duty on British woollens and worsteds is "incomprehensible, unrealistic and wrong."

He said he thinks the tariff increase announced by Finance Minister Fleming in his budget speech Tuesday, will have to be negotiated under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

Mr. Balcon now is doing public relations work for British woollens and worsteds.

Arthur E. Gelber, secretary-treasurer of Gelber Brothers Limited, said "In view of the expressed desire of the Diefenbaker government to increase trade with Britain and the Commonwealth, I can't understand raising the tariff."

Gerald Peers, Toronto chairman of the British Textile Agents' Association of Canada, said the increase not only discriminated against British but worked against the policy of increasing trade with the U.K.

"The British woollen and worsted industry's participation in the Canadian market is down this year, while Italian and other foreign participation has increased over 100 per cent. There has also been no indication of what the government will do regarding the threat of Japanese exports," he said.

Ten Senior Canadian Doctors Honored By Medical Ass'n

HALIFAX (CP) — Ten senior Canadian doctors were honored here Wednesday by the Canadian Medical Association for their contributions to medicine, community and country.

The doctors were given life memberships in the 12,000-member CMA at its annual general assembly.

The following received citations from retiring president Dr. Morley Young of Lamont, Alta.: Dr. Frank Millwood Bryant, 73, of Victoria; Dr. Robert Randolph Bunn, 72, of Red Deer, Alta.; Dr. John Boyle Ritchie, 71, of Regina; Dr. Adam Fisher Menzies of Morden, Man.; Dr. James Christopher Gillis, 73, of Fort William, Ont.; Dr. James Geggie, 72, of Wakefield, Que.; Dr. Hugh Pius O'Neill, 71, of St. Andrews, N.B.; Dr. Paul-Carmel Laporte, 73, of Edmundston, N.B.; Dr. Myles Gregory Tompkins, 71, of Glace Bay, N.S., and Dr. John Ignatius O'Connell, 84, of Curling, Nfld.

Dr. Neil graduated from Columbia University in 1902 and practised 10 years in New York. During the First World War he was captain in the Canadian Army Medical Corps. He now serves on the staff of Charlotte County Hospital.

Dr. Laporte graduated from Laval University in 1909. He has practised in Grand Falls and Edmundston, N.B. He has been

awarded a certificate from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons and is a past president of the New Brunswick Medical Society. He is on the clinical staff of Hotel Dieu Hospital at Edmundston.

Dr. Tompkins worked on a farm and was employed by the CPR before graduation from Dalhousie University in 1914. He is a past president of the Nova Scotia Medical Society. Three of Dr. Tompkins' eight children are doctors.

Dr. O'Connell graduated from Dalhousie in 1905 and served in the Canadian Army Medical Corps and the 3rd Canadian Field Ambulance during the First World War. After the war he began practising at Curling. He is still active and serves as medical health officer for the Bay of Islands.

United Nations Report Is Given On Col. Flint Death

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—In the cold, clinical words of the United Nations report, the world was told Wednesday how Canada's Lt.-Col. George A. Flint was killed last month while trying to stop a fight between Israelis and Arabs.

The report said it is "probable" that a bullet from Arab Jordanian-controlled territory was responsible for the death of the 47-year-old officer in a disputed area of Mount Scopus, near Jerusalem.

It appears that Flint, chairman of the UN Israeli-Jordan Mixed Armistice Commission, died instantly from a rifle bullet and did not bleed to death as was earlier reported, the UN analysis said. He was a native of Outremont, a Montreal suburb.

The UN made public a report signed by Maj.-Gen. Carl von Horn, Swedish chief of staff of the UN Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine, who led investigation into Flint's death.

RESOLVE ATTEMPT
In detail, the 6,000-word report explains that Flint was trying to rescue Israeli wounded when the fatal bullet came during a clash more than six hours between Arabs and Israelis within a mile of Jerusalem. Earlier he had headed with both sides for an end to the skirmish.

The words of the UN report were formal and factual, but earlier the UN Security Council commended Flint in more human terms, as a gallant soldier of Canada and servant of the UN.

The conclusion that it was an Arab bullet — apparently from a lone sniper — that killed Flint was a deduction from various statements and from the position of the body and the wound, the report said.

The only doubt lay in the possibility that the fatal bullet had ricocheted, it added. Flint was carrying a white flag when he approached the area of fire.

MIGHT EASE TENSION
In a section devoted to conclusions, von Horn's report said acceptance of a 1954 status quo policy initiated by his predecessor, Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, "might help in diminishing tension" in the Mount Scopus region.

Von Horn said that despite efforts by him and Flint over the months to relax tension on Scopus, "contracts and conditions have continued to increase as a result of the expansion of controlling activities of the Israeli police and of the reactions to these activities."

Von Horn urged that Israeli police avoid patrolling in areas inhabited by Arabs, as earlier recommended by Burns.

Flint had gone to the Israeli sector in response to a Jordanian complaint that Israelis were firing on a Jordanian village.

The fatal bullet passed through his chest while he was facing east toward Jordanian-controlled territory, taking cover, apparently because of "the belief in the

party at that time that sniper fire was originating from the east." The sniper was never found.

Von Horn said Israeli authorities denied his observers complete freedom of movement in their investigation and they finally gave up trying to make an on-the-spot inquiry, deciding they had enough evidence without it.

The following day will be mainly taken up with getting settled into camp, and getting acquainted with their sister Guides from other parts of Canada, Great Britain and the United States.

In the evening, they will be welcomed by a dinner at Shaw's Hotel, given in their honour by the Government of Prince Edward Island.

For their first Sunday in camp, Church Services will be conducted on the campsite. On Monday, July 7th, the members of the Provincial Council and executive of the Girl Guide Association will play the role of hostesses by providing cars for a full day of visiting of sites of historic interest in Charlottetown. At noon, the Guides will be guests of the Rotary Club of Charlottetown at a luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel. Later the same afternoon they will be entertained by the Lieutenant Governor of P.E.I. and Mrs.

Hyndman at Government House before returning to their camp at Brackley Beach.

Each of the following three days will find a different group of about 30 girls, leaving for an overnight hike to Robinson's Island, with the thrill of deep sea-fishing, swimming at Cavendish, and visiting Green Gables, where all the pages of Lucy Maude Montgomery's immortal Anne books will come to life on the Haunted Woods, Lovers' Lane and beside the Lake of Shining Waters.

While part of the camp is hiking, the groups awaiting their turn will receive instruction in handicrafts typical of the Island, in photography, in nature lore and swimming. Just in case the weatherman may not always cooperate with fine weather, even this has been capably met with a programme of educational movies about Prince Edward Island, included in their excursions will be a visit to a lobster factory, and the experience of digging for clams and steaming them on the seashore.

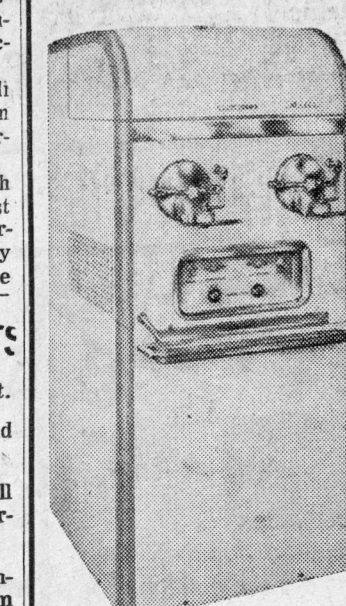
