CENTRAL GUARDIAN Speaks On Physical Fitness At Rotary

Mr. Earl Nicholson, Director of Physical Education for City Schools was guest speaker at the regular weekly dinner meeting of the Rotary Club in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday when he dealt with the subject "Physical Fitness."

"The general function of physical education in the public school is to assist in providing a medium for the normal and natural development of each pupil," Mr. Nicholson said.

"Social development and education is a natural function contributed to in a great measure while on the campus rather than in the classroom," the speaker said.

"The intellectual objective dealt with the necessity of imparting sufficient knowledge of healthful living so that the pupil will be equipped to make the best possible adjustment in adult life so far as health knowledge is needed."

"Physical education should share in the responsibility for training youth in citizenship," the speaker said.

"There is a unique opportunity here to develop citizenship through putting principles in practice. An example of this is when a child learns through sports, the importance and need of loyalty, cooperation and teamwork," the speaker concluded.

The speaker was introduced by chairman Ken Parker and thanked for his address by the co-chairman, Alf Pickard.

Analysis Of Local Unemployment Figures

Charlottetown National Employment Office released figures yesterday revealing the extent of unemployment in the City.

The office records show 260 males and 75 females as unemployed. The males range in age from sixteen to seventy years or more, and includes a number who because of disabilities or advanced years are fit only for the lightest kind of employment. Numbered with those in the upper age brackets are a dozen retired railroad men.

Some of the teen-age unemployed are likewise only capable of light tasks. A good proportion of those idle have been caught in the annual seasonal employment slump, which develops every autumn.

Many local business concerns following a custom of long standing have made cut-backs of their staffs until the spring. These layoffs are small in most cases but in the aggregate build up quickly to a considerable figure.

The local Employment offices estimate—and it is only an estimate—that unemployment figures in midwinter will be 12 to 15% higher than they were a year ago.
