St. Mary's Academy Class Receives Highest Marks

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Choral reading competitions filled the entire program of the second day of the Summerside section of the P.E.I. Festival of Music held at Civic Auditorium yesterday, adjudicated by Dr. C. Frederick MacRae, professor of English at Mount Allison University.

The highest mark of 90 awarded during the day went to grade nine pupils of St. Mary's Academy, for their choral rendition of "If" by Rudyard Kipling and "A Summer Storm" by D. C. Scott.

The afternoon program saw keen competition which resulted in close scores as schools from various parts of the county vied for top honors.

North Tryon School won first in choral reading in primary, intermediate, senior boys and senior girls classes while the highest mark of the afternoon went to the Trinity Explorers group of Summerside who received an 88 for their choral rendition of "Palms 121.23." in the church schools, under 12 years of age class.

All passenger train service from Charlottetown to eastern points on P.E.I. will be curtailed beginning Friday, CNR announced yesterday. This includes passenger service now operated to Murray Harbor, Souris East, Georgetown and all connecting points.

A motor vehicle service will carry mail until this service is restored Dec. 15th.

OFFICE TO OPEN

The Green Gables summer post office will be opened Friday and remain open until October 31, it has been announced by the district director of postal services. Mails will be exchanged daily except Sunday, with Hunter River post office, via Hunter River R.R.I.

WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS

The department of highways announced new weight restrictions for vehicles with registered rates of over 16,000 pounds yesterday. Beginning yesterday at noon all such vehicles were allowed to carry a limit of half their registered weights. Vehicles of 16,000 are allowed a limit of 8,000.

Elderly Woman Badly Burned In Blaze At Emerald Sunday

SUMMERSIDE—Mrs. Austin Emerald was taken to Charlottetown Hospital Sunday after being badly burned in a fire in her home that was confined to an upstairs bedroom.

Mrs. Murphy, who is in her seventies, was sick in bed at the time the blaze of unknown origin broke out, in the bedroom which she was occupying. During the fire Mrs. Murphy's clothes caught fire causing severe burns to her face and parts of her body. Neighbors removed furniture and other belongings from the home as it was feared for a time it could not be saved. However, their combined efforts were rewarded and they confined the flames to the one room which was badly charred. Mrs. Murphy lived with another woman in her Emerald home.

Two-Year Prison Sentence Drawn By Alberton Resident

SUMMERSIDE—A 21-year-old Alberton man, Ronald Ramsay drew a two-year term in Dorchester Penitentiary when he appeared in Magistrate's Court here yesterday morning on a charge of break, entry and theft. The young man pleaded guilty to breaking into and entering the store of Cyril R. Leard of Alberton and stealing goods valued at approximately \$100.

ROMP Constable Bungay told the court the offence was committed early Sunday morning. He said some of the stolen goods had been located in the house where the Alberton man resides. The loot included a wallet, two men's wrist watches and a cigarette lighter. Cash amounting to \$6.50 was not recovered. Ramsay had a previous record which included a one-year term in Prince County Jail on a similar conviction.

In other cases on the docket a Tignish man pleaded not guilty to charges of assault causing bodily harm and creating a disturbance by swearing and using insulting and obscene language. His case was adjourned until May 19th. He is represented by J. Watson MacNaught, QC.

Three men appeared on charges of fishing smelts out of season. An O'Leary man pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs while the other two, Howland and Parkdale men, pleaded not guilty.

Weekly Run Is Preferred By Shippers

Prince Edward Island's main objection to having a Newfoundland ship operating the P.E.I.-Newfoundland run is that the best service that can be offered would be at 10 to 12-day intervals.

Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, minister of industry and natural resources, said yesterday Island shippers prefer the weekly service they have become accustomed to during the past three years.

Mr. MacKinnon said he would be only too willing to co-operate with the Newfoundland government but it was important that livestock shipments be made at weekly intervals and that shippers be assured of the time of boat sailings.

The Pictou-owned M.V. Fergus has been operating in this service for the past three years. He said the services and facilities provided by the Fergus during that time have been of the highest quality.

Mr. MacKinnon was commenting on a report from St. John's in which that city's Board of Trade had requested a subsidy for a Newfoundland boat on this run.

Robert C. Dewar Dies In Montague

MONTAGUE—The death occurred at the King's County Memorial Hospital on Monday of Robert Cameron Dewar of Brudenell in his 87th year. The late Mr. Dewar was born at Brudenell where he farmed for his entire life. He was a member of the Masonic Order and a sergeant with the artillery. He was a man that was well known and respected by all who knew him.

He leaves to mourn, one daughter Jean (Mrs. Ira Sanderson), Midgell, and two grand children. His wife the former Margaret Jane Gordon of Brudenell predeceased him about 15 years ago.

The funeral will take place today at two p.m. from the Church of Christ, Montague. Interment will be in the Brudenell cemetery.

FERGUS IN PORT

MV Brion Due To Arrive Today

The department of industry and natural resources shipping service to north shore points is expected to get underway today with the arrival of the motor vessel Brion at Charlottetown at 10 a.m.

The vessel, under the command of Captain H. Turbis, will be loading a cargo of general produce at the city port, and will later call at Summerside for additional cargo before proceeding to Seven Islands and other St. Lawrence points.

The Brion was delayed at Halifax by inspection officials which held up the start of the service for several days.

The ship, which has a capacity of 550 tons and can carry tons of refrigerated goods, will make stops at two ports on P.E.I. during each visit which will come at 15-day intervals. Souris, Montague and Georgetown have been designated as future ports of call.

Meanwhile MV Fergus docked at Charlottetown's Railway Wharf yesterday to load a general produce cargo to Newfoundland. The Fergus, which has operated on the Newfoundland run for the past three years, will be making her last trip under her present contract which expires April 30th.

The contract has not yet been renewed by Ottawa as yet. Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, minister of industry and natural resources, said yesterday. However, Mr. MacKinnon felt the ship would continue to operate on the assumption that the federal subsidy would be forthcoming.

The minister said that during a recent trip to Ottawa he had been informed that an amount of \$104,000 had been set aside in the estimates as a subsidy for the Newfoundland service. The P.E.I. government reimburses Ottawa on a 20 per cent basis.

The Fergus is due to leave Charlottetown for St. John's, Nfld., Friday.

Speedy Trial Is Elected
