

Mainliner In Upset Hambletonian Victory

 CROSHEN, N.Y., Aug. 9 — (AP) — Mainliner, from the stable of Milwaukee's Ralph H. Kroening, captured the 26th and richest of all Hambletonian stakes today in two straight heats — something his daddy couldn't accomplish eight years ago.

It was the first time Kroening, who bought the colt for \$25,000 last August, had ever seen Mainliner. With Guy Crippen, 59-year-old pilot of the Grand Circuit in the sulky, the brown three-year-old son of Worthy Boy-Sister Mary collected a record winner's purse of \$31,347.

Beaten back in the dust of ancient Good Time Park's triangular course, were 20 other of the finest sophomore trotters in the United States, including the favored entry of Mighty Fine and Spennib from the Hayes Fair Acres stable, Du Quoin, Ill.

Last year's Hambletonian was won by a Hayes Fair Acres colt — Eusty Song.

The field of 21 was the largest ever to start in the world famous Kentucky Derby of harness racing, and they were shooting for \$95,263 — the biggest total purse since the race was inaugurated in 1926.

Mainliner was a 25 to 1 shot in the first heat but sailed home a two-length winner over Spennib, with Yankee Hanover, owned by Mrs. John L. Wehle, Rochester, N.Y., third. The time was a good 1:02 3/5.

The Kroening colt handed a two-length beating to Scotch Rhythm, one of the highly-regarded fillies in the race, in the second spin around Good Time's mile. The winning time was 2:04 3/5.

Candy Man, owned by K.D. Owens, Houston, Tex., was a surprising third in the final dash.

Mainliner's sire, Worthy Boy, captured the first heat of the 1943 Hambletonian, raced at Empire City Cunnning Track because of wartime travel restrictions. Buy Volo Song won the next two heats.

Mainliner got back \$38.30, \$19.60 and \$9.80 in the first heat. This was the second largest Hambletonian prize. The Ambassador paid \$62.20 in 1942.

A disappointing crowd of 15,000 turned out.

Three Canadian drivers took a crack at the buggy-whip classic but only Ralph Baldwin, the veteran harnessman from Lloydminster, Sask., came close to making a race of it. Driving Scotch Rhythm from the No. 4 post, Baldwin got off to a poor start in the first heat and finished 19th. But in the second heat Baldwin pushed the star filly to a strong second-place finish, two lengths behind Mainliner.

This gave Scotch Rhythm third place and a prize of more than \$11,000.

Mahlon Hanover, with Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. I., and Prince Colby, driven by Clint Hodgins of Clandeboye, Ont., finished far back in both heats.

Viscount Alexander Becomes Chief Of Blood Indian Tribe

STANDOFF, Alta., Aug. 9—(CP)—Chief Shot-Both-Sides put a feather bonnet on Viscount Alexander's head and the Governor-General became Chief Pit-O-To-Kan of the Blood Indian tribe.

He smoked the pipe of peace and led off a ceremonial dance with Mrs. Shot-Both-Sides while other Indian chiefs and white honorary chieftains danced with Indian squaws.

In the same ceremony, the Viscount's sons—Shane, 16, and Brian, 12, were admitted to membership in the tribe as braves.

Pot-O-To-Kan means "Eagle Head." Shane's Indian name is "Many Fingers." Brian is "Eagle Speaker."

The initiation ceremony took place during the Bloods' annual sun dance at Standoff, 20 miles south of MacLeod in Southwestern Alberta. Present were hundreds of Indians of the tribe and other member tribes of the Blackfoot confederacy.

Viscount Alexander has been patron of the honorary Kainai chieftainship since its formation in December, 1950. His induction into the membership of 36.

The Governor-General was presented to Chief Shot-Both-Sides by Archdeacon S. H. Middleton, principal for many years of the Anglican Residential School for Indians at Cardston, Alta.

The old chief speaks no English. He spoke through honorary chief Percy Creighton in welcoming the Viscount.

Then, before the feather-decked Blood chiefs, he put on the Governor-General's feather headdress and E. R. McFarland of Lethbridge, president of the chieftainship, presented a Kainai scroll.

The boys were given gifts by Mike Eagle Speaker and Albert Many Fingers whose names they took.

Rifle Team Leaves Here Today For Ottawa Shoot

Headed by team captain Major A. F. Gormley, a 28-man Provincial Rifle Association team will leave today for Ottawa where they will represent Prince Edward Island in the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association annual prize meeting to be held there during all of next week from Monday through Saturday.

Made up of fourteen senior snipers, nine tyros and five cadets, the team will set their sights for Ottawa this morning, some travelling by car and the remainder by rail.

In addition to the team personnel leaving from here, two important members of the Provincial team, Miss Mary MacLennan of Alexandria and Sergeant G.A. Coles of Summerside, will join the team at Ottawa where they will compete in the forthcoming competitions. Miss MacLennan and Sgt. Coles were the two island representatives competing on the Canadian rifle team at Bilsley, England, and just arrived back in Canada earlier this week. Crack Down On Three More Jockeys In Ontario

HAMILTON, Aug. 9 — (CP)—The Ontario Racing Commission cracked down today on three more jockeys for the parts they played in the suspected fixing of horse races on Ontario tracks in June and July.

Police stepped in again to arrest one of them—George Thompson of Hamilton—on a charge of perjury after the commission barred him and Bobby Merchant of Montreal and Gordon Cox of Hamilton from entering or riding on Ontario tracks for life.

Thompson was the second jockey arrested since the commission's probe got under way about two weeks ago and came less than 24 hours after Robert Wankmueller of Newark, N. J., was taken into custody following testimony before the commission.

Wankmueller, said to be the payoff man among the eight riders now set down, has been charged with defrauding the public. He was remanded to Aug. 15 when he appeared before a justice of peace today. So far he has not been able to raise procey or cash bail of \$6,000.

Of the eight jockeys suspended, six have been ruled off tracks in Ontario for life and two others have been set down indefinitely. Besides Thompson, Wankmueller, Merchant and Cox the others with life suspensions are Phil Mar-ches of Pawtucket, R. I., and Bobby Keane of Toronto.

Until today's action by the commission in what has been described as the worst race-track scandal in the Province's history, Thompson and Merchant had been suspended indefinitely along with apprentice rider John Bromby of Toronto and jockey Charles Bright of Muncie, Ind.

The commission said today further investigations are being carried out in the cases involving Bromby and Bright.

Thompson's arrest today was said to be the start of a "blow off" of the whole race-fixing ring believed to be headed by Toronto gamblers. Besides the jockeys involved police have so far arrested three men who are believed to have inside tips on fix races. They were charged with defrauding the public after their arrests while attempting to cash mutual tickets at the Fort Erie track.

 CHICAGO, Aug. 9 — (AP) — More than half the hand-picked 74-man field in the \$50,000 "world" championship of golf murdered par in today's dazzling inaugural round in which four players shared first place with five-under-par 67s.

Despite the presence of U.S. open champion Ben Hogan, who came up with a 68, the scent of the \$12,500 first prize aroused the fighting blood of star and underdog alike at the start of the lush 72-hole meet on the par 36-36-72 Tam O'Shanter course.

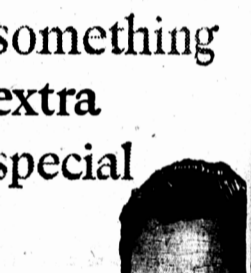
In all, 46 players smashed perhaps the greatest day of shooting in Tam history — including besides the four 67s, eight 68s, 11 69s, 10 70s, and 10 71s.

The four cracklocked leaders were Jimmy Demaret, Ojal, Calif.; Ted Kroll, New Hartford, N.Y.; Al Brooch, Garden City, N.Y., and Ray Gafford, 37-year-old outsider from Dallas, Tex.

Hogan, making his first return to Tam O'Shanter in four years, had to drop a 10-foot putt on the 18th green to avoid being caught in a traffic jam of 14 players tied at 68.

At that, Hogan was snarled with seven other players at 68, including Eric Cremin, Tiny Sydney, Australian star making his first United States tour; all-American champion Cary Middlecoff, Memphis, Tenn.; Jerry Barber, Pasadena, Calif.; Lawson Little, Pebble Beach, Calif.; Earl Stewart, Jr., Dallas, Tex.; Glenn Teal, Knoxville, Tenn.; and E.J. Harrison, St. Andrews, Ill.
