Mobbing a Great Musician.

LONDON, June 15.—English people have not yet reached those heights of virtuous worship which have been attained in Germany by the admirers of Liszt, who on one occasion had to wade ankle deep through roses in order to reach a piano, but they are not far behind, if one may judge by the unseemly conduct of Herr Paderewski's audience at St. James' Hall today. Anything more ridiculous can hardly be imagined. On returning to his acknowledgements Paderewski found himself in the centre of a seething mob of delicious women, who pelted him with flowers and nearly tore off his coat in their efforts to grab him by the hand.

One young lady, presumably in her desire to join in the pastime of mobbing the lion of the hour, fairly hurled herself headlong on the platform. The ovation finally resolved itself into a howling pandemonium, from which the poor artist was rescued by his friends.

Paderewski has taken London by storm. His recital yesterday at St. James' Hall was undeniably the greatest musical event of the season. There was an immense audience, the receipts being enormous, \$8,000. This is a figure that even Rubenstein never reached in London, and the event is all the more remarkable because "everybody is out of town."
