Dodgers Are Champs; Whip White Sox 9-3

By JACK HAND CHICAGO (AP)—Los Angeles' amazing Dodgers became the first club in modern baseball history to climb from seventh place to a world championship in one year when they overwhelmed Chicago's White Sox 9-3 Thursday to win the world series four games to two.

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OLD STALWART HELPED TURN TIDE IN CLINCHER

"It was a fast ball away from me," he said, Early Wynn was pitching and "as he always does, he was putting 'em in and out. I didn't guess it was a fast ball but it went outside. It had that good feel to it. When you hit a ball real good you don't feel the contact."

THE RAGS-TO-RICHES story was concluded yesterday afternoon on the playing surface of Chicago's Comiskey Park. The "poor" Los Angeles Dodgers who floundered around next door to the basement in the National League in 1958 were crowned champions of the baseball world before some 48,000 loyal White Sox fans who had come to the ball park to see their "darlings" force a seventh and deciding issue.

WALTER ALSTON didn't have to win the world series to win the acclaim of baseball experts everywhere. Any man that can tell practically the same outfit that could do nothing right in 1958 and make them National League champions in 1959 richly deserves the manager-of-the-year award. That's exactly what Alston did and while this was taking place the rest of the senior circuit looked on in amazement. After this prize was won, the world series was next on the list and again the experts said the Dodgers couldn't beat the White Sox. But after all, the experts never gave Alston a chance to make the world series, so why should their opinion bother him at this stage of the proceedings.

BADLY BATTERED by the Pale Hoos in that opener on October 1, the Dodgers came bouncing off the floor to win the next three contests and take a commanding 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series. They had every intention of closing things out in that fifth game but a great strategist by the name of Lopez delayed the crowning ceremonies until yesterday.

JOHNNY PODRES didn't get the satisfaction of registering his number 2 in the 1959 world series. With an 8-0 lead, it seemed certain that Johnny would go the distance but Walter Alston was taking no chances.

When Podres hit Landis with one out in the fourth, it seemed to throw him off balance. He then proceeded to walk Sherm Lollar and next served up a home run ball to big Ted Kluszewski. With the score reading 8-3 Podres walked Al Smith and Alston thought it was time to stop the fooling. He called in young Larry Sherry who yielded only four hits the rest of the way and kept the White Sox from scoring. It was Sherry's victory, his second in the 1959 series. In addition to winning two, Larry saved game two for Podres and game three for Drysdale.

FOR ALSTON it surely must have been his greatest satisfaction. Sure he won the 1955 world crown but that time he was expected to at least be in the world series. Four years later he finds his team in the classic fighting Chicago White Sox for baseball supremacy and most folks were wondering how he ever got there. Milwaukee Braves and San Francisco Giants are still dumfounded at the turn of events in the last ten days of the regular season.

The Dodgers went into Seals Stadium in San Francisco on September 19 needing to win three games from the home club, the Giants. As it worked out two would not be enough. The Los Angeles team needed a clean sweep and they got exactly what they wanted. Right then and there the Giants' cause was finished.

THE DODGERS were writing too great a story to have it end without a world crown. These Los Angeles boys had become convinced that this world championship belonged to them and they were not to be denied. The greatest moves that the White Sox might could seem to us were not sufficient to put the breaks on the Los Angeles march.
