Adult Education Official Addresses Island Seminar

"We can no longer afford the cost of ignorance in our society. Education at all levels with its overwhelming financial burdens is the price that our country must pay if it is to remain an industrial nation or the march to better economic prosperity," said Julian Pezet of Moncton.

Mr. Pezet, president of the Maritime Adult Education Council and director of adult education, University of Moncton, addressed a seminar on "continuing education" which was held in Dalvay Friday afternoon.

The purpose of this seminar was to discuss needs for the development of a national policy on continuing adult education, and to determine what steps should be taken by interested individuals and organizations in the province to assist in early realization of a coherent policy for continuing education.

DRAMATIC CHANGE

Mr. Pezet told the gathering that education of adults in Canada is changing dramatically.

"At one time it was a relatively small undertaking, concentrated in the extension activities of a number of universities, and departments of agriculture, education for new citizens and night school programs of a remedial nature," he said.

"We have never understood or even considered the implications and meaning of adult education, and we have never analyzed and assessed a workable system of continuing education. We have never established a distinction between formal education and adult education, between the teaching of children and the teaching of adults. Our adult classes have merely been a repetition of day classes based exclusively on educational practices, principles and philosophy of children."

"Programs of adult learning must be carefully planned and organized with people and not for people. It remains the task of those of us engaged in adult education to help people determine and access their needs and to advise them in the possible solutions to their problems. It remains the role of the government to encourage, stimulate and finance adult education programs but not to control, direct, organize or impose them. The people themselves must decide their needs and interests.

"Particularly in adult education, the accent is not on teaching but on learning. You do not teach adults. You only place them in situations where they must learn. Consequently, the teacher must play an essential but different role from the conventional one. Teachers of adults must learn the methods and techniques of adult teaching. They must possess a basic understanding of the philosophy and principles of adult education as well as a sound knowledge of psychology and motivations of adults if they are to succeed," stated Mr. Pezet.

"By placing the learner and learning in the central position of our society, we will emerge into our second century more confident and vigorous, with a feeling of belonging. A systematic program of continuous learning is certainly the most solid cornerstone we can provide for the Canada of the future," he concluded.

An autopsy was performed yesterday at the P.E.I. Hospital and the jury viewed the body. The jury members were sworn in at one o'clock yesterday afternoon and by Coroner, Dr. Allan MacMillan, the inquest was adjourned to Wednesday June 22 at 7:30 p.m. at the city court house.

The child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Younker, was struck by a 1966 Anglia near the Southport School about 7 o'clock. Her home is near the school on the opposite side of the road. She was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital by the MacLean ambulance. She died shortly after.

The RCMP have not yet released the name of the driver.

106th Anniversary To Be Celebrated

The 106th anniversary of the Zion Presbyterian Church will be celebrated by the congregation on Sunday, June 19th with service at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Services will be conducted by the minister, Rev. Donald A. Campbell, B.A., D.D. Special music for the occasion will be under the direction of the organist, Mrs. Harvey MacKinnon.

The congregation of Queen Square Church on the south side of Richmond Street was officially recognized in 1860, and this congregation was amalgamated with the Free Church which was located on Upper Prince Street to form the Zion congregation in 1870. The last pastors of these two churches were Rev. George Sutherland and Rev. Alexander Falconer.

Following this union the congregation continued to grow so that a more commodious edifice was required. This need was satisfied by the opening of the present church at the corner of Prince and Grafton Streets, in 1913. It is interesting to note that the cost of the building at that time was only \$65,000.

The new building with a seating capacity of 1,200 and the church school room accommodating 300, met the requirements of the congregation until quite recently when post-war growth especially in the church school required the addition of 13 new classrooms which was completed in 1960. In 1963 a new Casavant Organ was installed and dedicated. The same year the lower assembly hall and kitchen were renovated, and the former was designated as the Coles Memorial Hall. The church has flourished during past years, and still continues to do so.

In April of 1966 the present minister of Zion, Rev. Donald A. Campbell, had the honor of having conferred upon him by his Alma Mater, The Presbyterian College, Montreal, the degree of Doctor of Divinity. This action of the College is also in recognition of the work of Zion Church in past years and in the present.

The congregation was served faithfully by the following ministers: Rev. John M. MacLeod, Rev. David Sutherland, Rev. D. B. MacLeod, Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Rev. George E. Ross, Rev. G. G. Strathie, Rev. George C. Taylor, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Rev. W. Harold Brown, and since 1959 by the Rev. Donald A. Campbell.

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Labor Minister Announces Request

Minister of Labor, Hubert B. McNeill, announced yesterday that he is requesting the federal government to respect the prevailing wage rates of the province of Prince Edward Island in all federal works done on Prince Edward Island and also for the work to be done on the Northumberland Causeway.

Dr. McNeill stated that in many cases the Federal Government are, using prevailing rates much lower than is paid by some employers on Prince Edward Island and in some cases below the minimum of \$1.25 accepted by the Department of Labor at Ottawa.

The Members of Parliament for Prince Edward Island: David MacDonald, Melvin J. McQuaid, Honourable J. Angus MacLean, and Heath MacQuarrie will be asked to lend their support in ensuring that minimum rates of federal projects will not be below the provincial standards.

Investigation is being made at present and the information obtained will be available to the federal authorities. The prevailing wage rates which are minimum for projects assisted by provincial participations are as follows: Labourer \$1.25 per hour; Painter \$1.60 per hour; Glazier \$1.50 per hour; Paint Sprayer \$1.65 per hour; Carpenter \$1.85 per hour; Plumber \$2.00 per hour; Electrician \$2.00 per hour; Bricklayer \$2.85 per hour; Plasterer \$2.25 per hour; Cement Finisher \$1.65 per hour; Welder \$1.85 per hour; Truck Driver \$1.50 per hour.

To be effective immediately and to be applicable to all future contracts and jobs of work including the following: Schools; Highway Work; Bridge Work; Public Works; Senior Citizens Homes; Homes of Special Care; Housing under the Prince Edward Island Housing Authority; All construction projects assisted by the Government of Prince Edward Island.

Richard G. Vail, city, charged with littering the streets was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

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



