Egg Washing Machine Installed

SUMMERSIDE — The staff of the Summerside Co-operative egg grading station has recently been getting help in washing eggs. In fact, it no longer cleans the eggs, thanks to an ingenious egg washing machine installed about the first of June.

The new washer, built in New Jersey, is capable of washing 30 dozen eggs in three minutes. As the eggs enter the circular type machine on plastic trays, they are subjected to water at a temperature of 110 degrees. The water contains a detergent that washes the eggs.

After being removed from the washing machine, the eggs are placed in storage overnight at a temperature of 50 degrees before being graded the following day.

There is no danger of eggs becoming mixed in with other products' lots, as each lot is tagged with the shipper's name.
