

Rare Scotch Epitaphs.

The following epitaphs are Scotch, and may be interesting to many readers: In a country churchyard near Paisley:

On John Davie, bookbinder, Kilmarnock, well known being, while in life, constantly on the trot:

"Here rests John Davie, see he may, For faith the body's tired, Who never rested night nor day, Till that day he expired."

On Joshua Lodge, tailor, in Edinburgh:

"Here lies the body of Joshua Lodge, Who failed for want of a moir cabbage; He never failed to have a moir, But death at last came to his bed, And left his wife to stay behind, But left his wife to stay behind, To eat what cabbage she could find."

In Leslie churchyard Fifeshire:

"Here lies the body of Andrew Brown, Sometimes a wright in Linnon town, In the year seventeen hundred and seventy-three, When counting his parents for to see, Of a cauld and a sair host, He died upon the Yorkshire coast."

On a schoolmaster in Cleish parish, Kinross shire:

"Here lies Willie M— his banes: Of Satan when you tak him, Gie him the schulin of your weans, For clever de's he'll m-k'em."

An eccentric character named John So, a native of Innerkip, bequeathed his property to a friend, on the condition that he would get engraved on his tombstone the following epitaph written by himself:

"So did John So, So did he live, So did he die, So so did he be, So let him be."

Farm Notes.

It is indisputable that the lean part of meat contains the real nutrition—the muscle-building part, and at the same time it forms the most digestible part of an animal; hence game is more digestible than domestic animals. With the tendency of people to only consume lean meat in this country, it is evident that over-fed mutton and pork will not find a ready sale for home consumption, and farmers feeding for this purpose should govern themselves accordingly.

Last Winter I secured from a well-known breeder of Shropshire sheep a ram of this breed. The distance travelled was short and made by express. On arrival this ram was as fine and useful appearing an animal as one could wish to see. When the time came he was put to work with about the same sized flock, and, as a result, I have three lambs to show for the season's work. I have read somewhere that a bull will occasionally be impotent for a period of six months after removal from one locality to another. This is the only solution of the mystery that I can think of, and advise those needing male animals to secure them long enough before they are wanted so that they may become wonted to their new quarters.—C. L. Gabelson in Breeder's Gazette.

APPLES AS DIET.—Children usually demand sugar in large quantities, and in some form it should be given them. There are few more agreeable or healthful forms in which to secure it than in fruit, an especially in good, sweet apples. An abundance of sweet apples, ripe and luscious, should be had in every household where there are children. Prepared in various ways they are important to the diet of the family. Baked with cream they are delicious. Fried breakfast dishes are superior to sliced sweet apples fried in butter. Cut the slices across the apple leaving the skin on, and cutting out the core. This dish will take the place of meats for two or three days in the week. Few fruits have as many elements for the sustaining of life and health, as the apples. In some countries an almost exclusive diet for weeks is made of apples prepared in various ways.

Not long since a widowed mother of several married sons, with whom at different times she spent several months, always a welcome visitor, said in the hearing of the writer: "I love all my daughters-in-law very much. 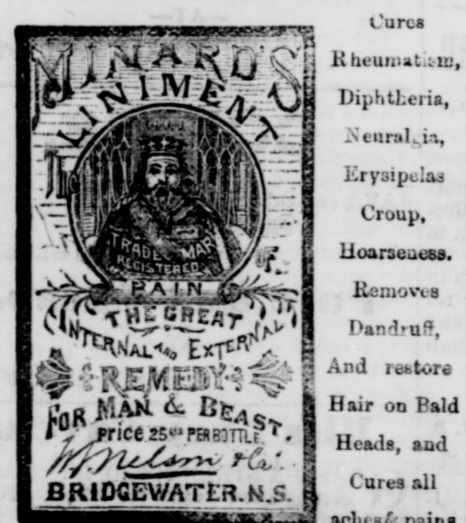
