### Doctor, Author Dies In London

LONDON (Reuters)—Dr. Marie Stopes, 78, pioneer of education in birth control and the author of many books on the subject, died Thursday at her home in Surrey. She was the founder with her late husband, aviation pioneer Humphrey Verdon Roe, of the world's first birth control clinic, which they opened in Holloway, north of London, in 1921. Her early books were described as "obscene" and were sometimes banned. Married Love — her best-known work which appeared in 1919 — sold 1,000,000 copies by 1950. She herself had two children. The first died in infancy. The second, a boy, born in 1924, is married and has a son.

### NEW CARS TOO LONG TO PARK

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Some 1959 model autos are too long, too low and covered with too many expensive gadgets to risk parking them, a St. Louis parking firm has decided. Wayne Stedelin of an auto parks company, said some new cars are nine inches longer than the old and wide that "we would have to rebuild our ramps to accommodate them." Owners of such cars are told in newspaper advertisements to stay away from the firm's six parking lots. Stedelin said lights in the front bumpers of some models, plus fancy grillwork, add to the legal perils of operating the firm. "We are studying dimensions of other cars now on the production lines," he said. "We may have to extend our bar to other new models."

#### GRANT AIR RIGHTS

WASHINGTON (AP)—The civil Aeronautics Board Thursday granted Scandinavian Airlines System the right to provide air service between Scandinavian countries and Anchorage, Alaska. ### Call Careless Smoker Great Fire Danger

OTTAWA (CT)—If you have a careless smoker around your home, he is a great fire danger. He causes more fire deaths in Canada than anything else. And forget the idea that carelessness of teen-aged and aged baby sitters can be considered generally safe. A National Research Council study of 638 fires in Ontario between 1954 and 1957 says it's just not so. A second NRC study—presented at a fire research and prevention conference here—showed that a person on the second floor of a dwelling has as little as two minutes to escape after a fire has started. This conclusion was reached in the experimental burning of a number of homes abandoned during construction of the St. Lawrence Seaway. The papers were presented at a conference sponsored by the council's building research division. It was attended by federal, provincial and municipal fire-fighting officials and observers from Britain and the United States. In the study on fire deaths it was found that of 254 deaths in building fires in Ontario in 1956 and 1957, a total of 53 were caused by bad smoking habits. Of the 53 deaths, 26 were caused by "someone not necessarily the victim falling asleep while smoking."

### Escapee Gets 2-Year Jail Sentence

SUMMERSIDE — Eric Arsenault, 20, Summerside was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary in Magistrate's Court here Thursday morning. Arsenault had previously pleaded guilty to a charge of escaping from jail Thursday night, September 24. He was the same two years for stealing a truck in his escape. The truck returned near Portage, was nearly demolished. A companion in the escape Roger Gallant of Duvar has also pleaded guilty to the same two charges. He will be sentenced October 6th. 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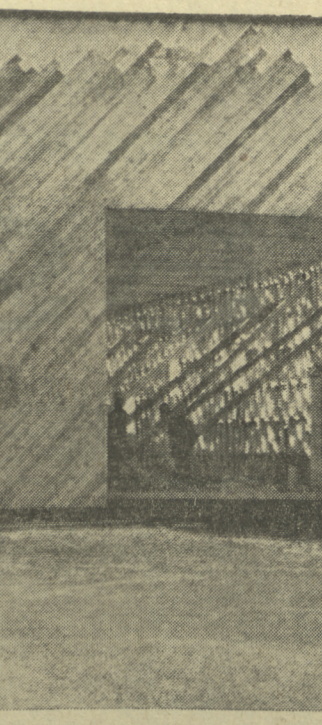
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### Y's Men To Sound-Proof "Y" Centre
