Premiers Meet To Be Informal

A formal agenda is unlikely for the Atlantic Provinces Premiers' Conference, to be held in St. John's, Nfld., on July 25 and 26. Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday.

"These conferences," he said, "usually have no fixed agenda and discussions are off the cuff. I will have no particular items to take to the meeting."

The premier suggested, however, that "these conferences usually revolve around financial matters, and for that reason Provincial Treasurer Melvin McQuaid will accompany me."

He added that industrial de-

velopment may come in for considerable discussion. "There is a new outlook," he said, "on the part of the people of the Atlantic Provinces, who are assessing their own opportunities. I have always claimed that this was a very important factor in improving our situation."

"All six provinces, identification of plans for industrial development is a common thing. This surge is due to activities of government, the publicity of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, and in our province the program of industrial promotion."

Billy Graham Blasts Titov's Atheistic View

SEATTLE (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham, whose appearance at the Seattle world's fair was reported in a recent Sunday edition of the paper, blasted the atheistic views of a Soviet communist spokesman.

"I have said in the past that I do not believe in the existence of God," said the spokesman. "I believe in the earth and sun and no God in heaven."

"This is a 45-minute address to a turnout of about 30,000," Dr. Graham referred to Titov's remark and said:

"This is like a little earthquake of an inch out of the ground and saying 'I don't see any Krushchev, therefore there is no Krushchev.'"

The evangelist said "neither America nor Russia will rule the world, no matter what is planned, and God has his plans for it."

He said the world is in deep trouble because man has rejected God, and "hated, lied and greed are the basic causes of human misery and suffering."

Conquest of space was a great thing but "man will take his sin and depravity with him."

"But 'we have the tools to make the 21st century the greatest of all centuries.'"

An estimated 1,500 converts answered the 45-year-old evangelist's call to "make a decision for Christ."

Nomination Is Rejected By Senator

By EDNA BLEAKLEY, ST. ANDREW'S, N.B. (CP) — Senator Muriel Ferguson, who had to decline a nomination of the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs because of ill health, was made an honorary president of the celebration of its 15th biennial convention Monday.

The Fredericton Senator charged to the meeting just long enough to collect her award, make a short speech and renew acquaintances. Her stay would have been even shorter but dense fog delayed her return flight to Fredericton.

Senator Ferguson has been a member of the 7,000-member federation for so long that she says she can't remember if it was 45 years. She believed it was St. John's, N.B., but switched to the Fredericton branch after being told.

Mrs. Ferguson told the 400 delegates that declining the nomination was "one of the saddest and disappointing decisions," she had ever made of her life.

She urged federation members to make women aware of the training they require to assume responsibility and duties "that must come with the wider opportunities in employment and education."

Mrs. Ferguson said she would devote much time and effort and practically dedicate themselves to such a cause.

She said it was her firm belief that the federation is seeking women more than ever to realize that for success in these fields they must be willing to devote much time and effort and practically dedicate themselves to such a cause.

It was women's fear of taking responsibility that kept them from securing recognition which was their due.

Commonwealth Study Conference Is Topic

A. D. Cameron of Charlottetown, a member of the Second Commonwealth Study Conference, presided over the 18th of the Duke of Edinburgh, was the speaker at the Rotary luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. Introduced by chairman Dr. Frank MacKinnon, the speaker was chaired by Dr. W. Curtis.



The conference came about through the success of the Oxford conference in 1956 and to a great extent through the initiative of the Canadian members who attended it. Mr. Cameron said it was organized and financed by Canadian industry and organized labor who set up a conference council under H. O. Vincent, Massey to direct the policy of the conference. Invitations to every part of the Commonwealth brought a response from 35 countries and territories. The total membership was 200, of which 75 were Canadian. Mr. Cameron stated.

The basic unit of organization of the conference itself was the study group consisting of about 15 members. The study groups were composed so to have the same sort of territorial distribution as the conference as a whole. From time to time and in the closing sessions of the conference, the study groups reported to plenary sessions which were chaired by the Duke of Edinburgh as a very active president.

The program of the conference was designed to give members opportunities to study the effects of industry on people in Canada as individuals, groups of individuals, and as communities.

Following the opening session in Montreal, the conference broke up into study groups visiting industrial areas in eastern Canada, followed by a similar run through cities and towns in Toronto to Vancouver.

Quoting Prince Phillip, Mr. Cameron said, "The success of this conference, will be measured by the effect it has upon the subsequent decisions of each member. It will be a success if your experience has helped you one of you to make a wiser guess as individuals which affect the lives of people involved in industry."

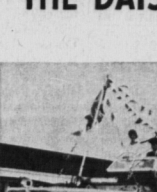
Finding guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, another was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.
