**Questions.**  
To P. A. McIntyre, Esq., M. D., Souris  
DEAR SIR.—As a general Dominion elec-  
tion is likely to occur at an early day,  
and as it is generally understood that  
you will then be a candidate for a seat in  
the next Parliament of Canada, you will  
not, I presume, take it amiss from one of  
the electors of this County, to interrogate  
you upon a few points affecting your past  
conduct while holding a seat in Parliament,  
as well as the policy you intend to pursue  
in the future, should you again be honored  
with a similar trust. As the subject is one  
which may prove of general interest, I take  
the liberty of approaching you through the  
Press, and beg that your reply shall reach  
me through the same medium. You will  
perceive, Sir, that the plan which I pro-  
posed will materially aid you in your en-  
deavors to place yourself in your proper  
light before the people, while it will re-  
move all manner of doubt upon questions  
about which some misunderstanding now  
appears to exist. You will, therefore, be  
good enough to say:—  
1st. Whether or not you did at any time  
during your term in Parliament deliberately  
vote against a proposed remission of duty  
on tea.  
2nd. Whether or not you ever voted  
against the shipping interests of the Mari-  
time Provinces?  
3rd. Whether or not you voted against a  
partial amnesty being granted to one W.  
D. O'Donohue, who has since died in ex-  
ile?  
4th. Whether or not you voted against  
a motion to expel from the House one,  
Louis Kiel, who (although at the time in-  
dicated for the murder of Thomas Scott)  
claimed his seat as member for Provencher,  
Manitoba?  
5th. Whether or not you ever opposed,  
in your place in the House, a proposed  
reduction of duty on imported petroleum?  
6th. Whether or not you considered it your  
duty as a member of Parliament for this  
country, to support all measures and  
motions emanating from the party claiming  
your political allegiance, rather than be  
guided at any time by common sense, or  
by the exercise of your own judgment  
upon questions involving the dearest inter-  
ests of your constituents, and upon subjects  
of general legislation? and,  
7th. You will have the kindness to say  
what your policy is at present, and what  
particular grievance, or class of grievances,  
your chief aim shall be to redress, should  
you be returned to Parliament at the next  
election?

**The National Policy.**  
SOME OPINIONS FROM PRINCE EDWARD IS-  
LAND.—THE PROTECTIVE TARIFF WORKS  
WELL—IMPROVED CONDITION OF FARMERS  
SINCE 1878.  
The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto  
Mail says: "It is said by leading Grit  
papers in the West that Prince Edward  
Island is deadly opposed to the National  
Policy. Here is a specimen of what the  
Islanders say about the operation of the  
tariff.  
"Mr. John Leslie, farmer, of Souris West,  
writes: "It would not be in the interests of  
agriculturalists in Canada to admit any  
kind of American produce free of duty.  
The duty on flour has not raised the price  
here, as the price is governed by the Euro-  
pean market. Farmers here would be  
greatly benefited by a reciprocity treaty  
with the United States, especially in their  
market for potatoes, but the present tariff,  
or a more stringent one, appears to be the  
only means of obtaining such. The cost of  
farm implements of all kinds is much  
cheaper, and hardware is lower and better  
under the present tariff. The general con-  
dition of the country is improved here since  
1878, and is still improving. I believe the  
National Policy is a step in the right di-  
rection. On all foreign products, excepting  
those of which we have not a sufficient  
quantity to supply the demand, the duty  
ought to be almost if not quite prohibitory.  
"Mr. William M. Simpson, Lot 18, Prince  
Edward Island, writes: "It would not be in  
the interest of agriculturists here to admit  
American farm produce free. Farm im-  
plements, since the tariff was established,  
are cheaper and better, including mowing  
machines, rakes, harrows, seeders, and  
smaller tools. There is no denying this.  
All woollens and cotton goods are cheaper  
under the present tariff, notably tweeds,  
winerys and worsteds. The home market  
for all kinds of produce has been improved,  
first by the duty on foreign products, and  
second by the encouragement of manufac-  
tures and the employment of more men at  
higher wages. The general condition of  
farmers and the laboring classes has im-  
proved since 1878.  
"Mr. Archibald Shaw, farmer, of New  
Perth, King's county, writes:—"The price  
of wool was increased under the present  
tariff, while woollens, cottons, and hard-  
ware in common use amongst farmers have  
not increased in price, but rather the  
opposite. Farm lands have increased in  
value, and the general condition of farmers  
and the laboring classes has improved since  
1878. It would not be in the interest of  
farmers to admit American farm produce  
free, unless it might be seed grains. Our  
flour has been cheaper since the introduc-  
tion of the National Policy. The price of  
pork has increased, and the farmer can sell  
to better advantage. The present price of  
pork is 10c. per lb.; ham, 11 to 14c. per lb.  
"Mr. Nelson Howatt, St. Eleanor's, Prince  
County, writes: "It would not be in the in-  
terests of agriculturists to admit American  
farm produce free. The present tariff has  
given us the home market for our oats and  
barley, the only grains grown here for ex-  
port. It has increased the price of pork.  
It has improved the market for eggs, poultry  
and butter. I believe we are now in a  
much better position to negotiate a reci-
