Mr. Don Schurman, New Annan, made a business trip to Summerside on Tuesday.

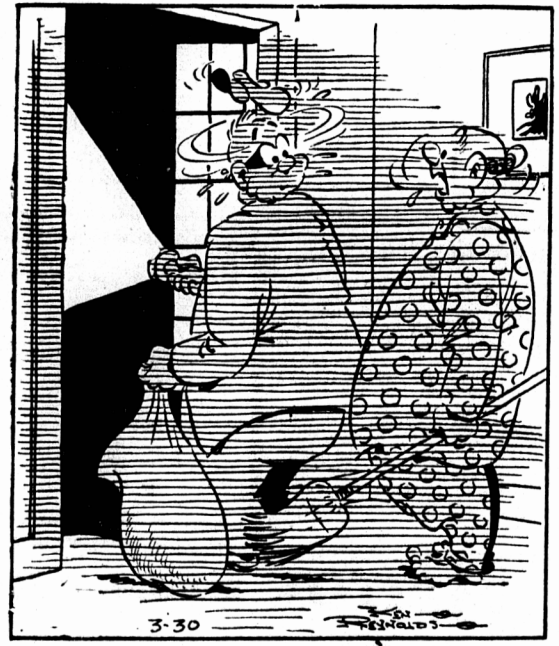

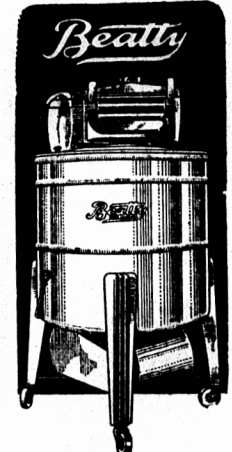

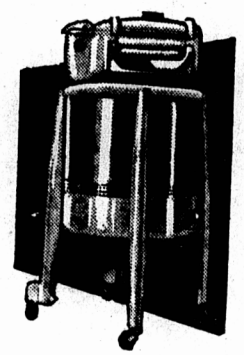
