

Bing Crosby Golf Tourney Has Come Long Distance

By JACK STEVENSON PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) Bing Crosby's golf tournament which started as a clambake for a few friends in 1937 celebrates its silver anniversary this week with \$104,500 in prizes awaiting the pros at Pebble Beach.

Confusion over the number of tournaments goes back to that first one, scheduled for two days but cut to one because of rain. Sam Snead won with a 63 at Rancho Santa Fe in southern California.
