S'side Planes Return From Flights In Arctic

Two weeks of Arctic flying were completed yesterday with the return to Summerside of the members of No. 2 specialist navigation course, their instructors and maintenance crews.

The polar operation, which is an important part of the final phase of the six months course, was very successful, according to Squadron Leader W. L. Gillespie of Summerside and Toronto who was in command.

The two Lancasters which transported the navigators came in yesterday from different directions and at different times. Polaris arrived at 10:21 A.M. after a long distance hop from Whitehorse, Y. T. in 13 hours and 21 minutes. Zenith arrived at 11:40 from Goose Bay, Labrador.

The day previously Zenith had flown "over the top" from Whitehorse to Goose Bay, this flight being one of the exercises of the trip. Mechanical trouble prevented Polaris from making the same flight.

This year, due to weather conditions, there was no flight to the pole. Last year Zenith performed the task of being the first R.C. - A. F. aircraft ever to fly over the north geographic pole.

During the operation 150 hours were flown by the two aircraft and a distance of 25,500 miles covered. All the flights over the hazardous northern terrain were uneventful. Whitehorse was the main base but Cambridge Bay on Cornwallis Island was used as an advance base. Here the members of the course encountered a man well known to many Charlottetown people, Cst. C. B. Michelson of the R.C.M.P., formerly of Charlottetown detachment.

Re-fueling on long flights was carried out at Cambridge Bay and all the manual labor is done by Eskimos. Landing was made on an ice strip where the snow had been plowed and rolled making a perfect runway. Gasoline is taken in to these advance bases in the summer by boat and the drums are cached in the snow.

On this operation new instruments were tested and the results will be analyzed later. S/L Gillespie felt that much valuable information had been obtained, especially for the Dominion Meteorological Office. Considerable photographic work was also done. Only one more week of work remains to complete this No. 2 course and then the eight officers will be posted to various stations.
