Familiar Georgetown Figure J. J. Ernest Doyle Dies At 94

GEORGETOWN — The death occurred at his home in Georgetown Monday, Dec. 14, of J. J. Ernest Doyle in his 94th year following a lengthy illness.

The deceased was born in Charlottetown, the son of Lawrence P. Doyle of St. Peter's and moved to Georgetown in 1877. He was predeceased by his wife, the former Mary J. Griffin, in 1947.

The late Mr. Doyle was well known throughout the province, as for many years prior to his retirement he was a locomotive engineer with the C.N.R.

He had at one time served as a Georgetown town councillor and for many years he was a trustee of St. James' Roman Catholic Church. In his passing Georgetown suffers the loss of one of its most highly respected citizens and his many friends will bear the loss of his passing with deep regret.

Left to mourn his death are three daughters: Mary M. Doyle R.V., Kathleen A. Doyle R.V., both of Cambridge, Mass., and St. St. Dorothy Marie C.N.D. Two sons, Dr. Philip E. Doyle, Ottawa and Lawrence G. Doyle of Garson, Ont. The funeral will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday at St. James' Roman Catholic Church, Georgetown.


