AN OLD MAN'S MEMORIES.
James K. Markle of West Flamboro, member of the War of 1812.

James K. Markle is a fine old man who takes a trip down to Dundas occasionally from Bull's Creek, and sometimes goes as far as Hamilton on the dummy railway. To look at him you would never think that it was 80 years of age. But, as he says himself, he was born at ten o'clock in the morning of the 21st of July, 1807, according to his grandfather's own handwriting. This interesting event occurred at Bull's Creek, Ontario, and with the exception of seven years spent in East Flamboro, Mr. Markle has lived in West Flamboro Township ever since. He was in Dundas with his family in 1816-70 years ago. Not many men can say that. He says that Dundas at that time consisted of three houses, a hog pen, a grist mill and a saw mill with one run of stones. The wheel was run by the water from the creek which still runs through Dundas, only that in those days there was as much water running through the town in summer as there is now in the spring. He has only been out of Canada four times. He says he was the fifth man to sign for the Banner newspaper, and he has been taking it ever since, although he always was a Conservative. At this rate it will take some time to be a good reformer of him. He has several great grandchildren. His grandfather came over to Niagara from Pennsylvania, crossing the Niagara river when it was frozen, after going with one run of stones. The ice broke and all he saved was his wife and his cap; he drew 600 acres of land from the Government on which is known as the Governor's road, running into an aster. Mr. Markle says he remembers the war of 1812. He also remembers when the Indians were thick around here. At Hockley's Farm, 20 or 25 Indians were at one time camped, at the place from April to December. His father had 200 bushels of potatoes planted on the farm where Jacob Tunis now lives, but the Indians discovered them and all that his father found when he went to dig them up was seven bushels. His father had a farm to Ben Tunis, whose grandfather Jacob Tunis was a farmer and a fine class of settlers they have made, and like so many others who came over from Pennsylvania, they have done well in Canada.—Dundas Banner.

The estimated value of mortgaged property held for sale was \$6,229,000, an increase of over a million compared with 1893. The amount charged against the property was \$6,264,000, so that it is not considered worth more than the amount of the mortgage on it. The total value of the real estate under mortgage in 1894 was \$1,193,000. In Ontario the loans secured by real estate amount to \$106,544,000, an increase of \$6,249,000 over 1893; Quebec, \$9,190,000, an increase of \$38,000; Nova Scotia, \$1,000,000, an increase of \$25,000. In Ontario compulsory proceedings to realize on the mortgages were taken in 1,133 cases. The amount overdue and in default on mortgages in Ontario during the year was \$3,170,000. The subscribed capital of the ninety-four companies is \$91,893,000.

Tricks in All Trades.
