Eastern News.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 28.

The Porte has sanctioned the cession of Masowah.

CAIRO, Nov. 28.

A number of British soldiers during a drunken brawl at Ramlah, yesterday, beat an Arab to death.

Fuad and Kamil Pashas have been arrested and will appear before the Commission of Enquiry in a few days.

Assyua Pasha has been appointed Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 28.

M. Manteuff, the Russian Statesman, died yesterday.

Madagascar.

LONDON, Nov. 28.

The Madagascar Ambassadors have refused France's ultimatum requiring recognition of French protection. The Ambassadors have started for London.

The Cox Murder.

DUBLIN, Nov. 28.

Five more arrests have been made in connexion with the Cox murder. It has been ascertained that the murderers were lying in wait for seven judges who passed the scene of the murder shortly after the shooting of Cox. [Particulars of the murder will be found in another column.]

LONDON, Nov. 28.

Mr. Raikes (Conservative) has been elected for Cambridge University by an immense majority.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.

A fire occurred in the works of the Brooklyn Oil Company, on Newton Creek, near Manhattan Avenue, to-night. The barque Thison was at the dock when the oil tank exploded that caused the fire, and the crew were compelled to jump overboard. Two were drowned. The flames extended to Devoe's oil tanks on the west side, and Church & Co.'s sal soda manufactory on the north side. The flying sparks set fire to Smith's box manufactory. The tank-boat Sweepstakes filled with oil, and lying at the dock, took fire and burst into fragments. The blazing oil spread out in the river and for a time it was feared that the fire would spread to Long Island City, but the tide in East River averted this danger. The barque Estelle lay close to the tank-boat and was also set on fire. The oil continued to burn at an early hour this morning.

The damage to the Brooklyn oil works is estimated at \$100,000; oil works, \$60,000; the barque Thison, \$50,000; Church & Coy's sal soda works, \$20,000, and box factory, \$10,000.

DUBLIN, Nov. 25.

David, in a speech at Navan, last night, eulogized the action of the Irish parliamentary party. Referring to the threatened famine in the west of Ireland, he declared that the tenant farmers should not starve in case they were unsuccessful in getting the Government to do its duty. He proposed to make the landlord support the people. If Gladstone did not apply the surplus of the arrears estimate to save the people then no rent should be paid from November until May.

LONDON, Nov. 26.

It was reported in the lobby of the House, on Friday night, that Richard O'Shaughnessy, member of Parliament for the city of Limerick, has been appointed permanent under-secretary for Ireland.

DUBLIN, Nov. 26.

The municipal elections here have resulted in the return of five Nationalists, two of whom were unopposed at the polls. The successful candidates take the places of Liberals.

CAIRO, Nov. 26.

A recent telegram from the Governor of Sudan announces that the rebels have been defeated at Derweir with great loss. Much plunder was taken.

Unconfirmed advices from Kordofan state that the False Prophet has been defeated and captured.

PITTSBURG, Penn., Nov. 26.

Adam Forsyth, yesterday, procured four sticks of dynamite for the purpose of killing fish in the stream near his house. He placed them in the oven to thaw out and left. Soon after a terrific explosion blew the house to atoms, killed Mrs. Forsyth and two children and badly cut another child.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

The Standard announces that the Duke of Edinburgh was seized with a serious attack of illness, on Thursday night, culminating in a cold of the severest description, attended by very high fever. His physicians remained with him all night and the Duchess never left the room. His Highness was somewhat better last evening. Mr. Gladstone stated, last evening, that Parliament would probably be summoned to meet in January.

Patrick Egan, treasurer of the late Land League, was present in the Commons last evening.

James Lillywhite, senior, the well-known cricketer, is dead. Lord Berwick is dead.

W. Sabar & Son, merchants, failed; liabilities, £20,000.

The Daily News states that the English Government received no communication from Spain leading to the conclusion that the Cuban refugees will be forthwith liberated, as affirmed in a recent despatch from Madrid.

The Times' St. Petersburg despatch says that the recent visit there of the Emperor and Empress was attended with extraordinary precautions; police were posted at every six yards; Drunks were massed at the corner of each street, and soldiers were drawn up outside their barracks. There is very great concern in St. Petersburg in consequence of the alarming increase in mortality from epidemic diseases, especially from diphtheria.

PARIS, Nov. 25.

The Union publishes a pontifical circular issued in connexion with the action of Signor Martinetti against the Papal Major

domo before the Court of Appeal, which confirmed the decision of the court of first instance that the jurisdiction of Italian tribunals extended within the walls of the Vatican. The circular declares that the sentence of Roman tribunals is in violation of the extra-territorial character of the Vatican and an insult to the Pope.
