

U.S. Caravaners Enjoying Visit To The Province

Completing the last quarter of a four month tour are a group of friendly Americans staying for the weekend at the trailer camp at Brackley Beach. They are from 20 States in the Union and belong to the Wally Byam Caravan which has been making such tours in many countries of the world for the past seven years.

Mrs. Helen Byam Schwaborn who is the executive secretary of the group now visiting the Island said yesterday "we like to be thought of as good will ambassadors."

She recalls that on their visit to Europe last summer, the people of the various countries told the caravaners they had done more to foster good will than all the ambassadors that had been there in a life time. "The people consider those in the diplomatic service as untouchables but we mix with and often visit in the homes of the ordinary folk. This has served to create very favorable relations," she said.

Wally Byam who was the originator of the trailer caravan idea is not with the group here. He is with another tour which is covering the Western part of United States but hopes to join the eastern tour in Quebec. Mrs. Schwaborn is his nearest relative.

Mr. Byam has to spend a part of his time in his business which is the manufacturing of trailers. It was after he had spent a number of vacations in his own trailer

From the happy expressions on the faces of the recipients, it would appear that the ancient order was being revived.

Mrs. Schwaborn on behalf of the group said she was greatly impressed with the co-operation of Mr. George Fraser of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau who arranged for parking space and for the various services such as laundry, milk, ice, bread etc.

This is the second time in two years that the Wally Byam caravan has visited Prince Edward Island and Mrs. Schwaborn said they would in all probability be back in two years time. Their present tour started June 22 and will end at Niagara on the Lakes on August 28.

Interesting Trip To England Reported By P. E. I. Boy Scouts

An interesting trip to England is reported by the Prince Edward Island Scouts who made the trip to the Jubilee Jamboree which is now underway at Sutton Park in Warwickshire.

Lloyd G. Matthews, O'Leary, Assistant Scout Master of the Island contingent writes from England in interesting detail of the trip. He recalls that the first leg of the flight was a bit rough and that was the one from P.E.I. to Moncton. It was by courtesy of the R.C.A.F. at Summerside. Some of the boys were having their first flight, but they all arrived in good shape.

At Moncton they checked in and after weighing in their kits, etc., they were lined up for inspection before boarding a fastlane Centaur Airways plane at one p.m. on the first real lap of the journey to England.

"A few of the boys got airsick taking off on our flight but once we gained altitude the flight began to get smooth and the boys began to relax."

"Then a Flight Lieutenant gave us instructions on the use of the Mae West (life preserver) which everyone had by his seat. There were sixty-eight scouts from Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.

"Dinner was then prepared at 2.15 by the two stewardesses, who are also qualified nurses, Miss Donna White and Miss Ann Hardy. "Scoutmaster W. Harding of Lancaster, N.B. who was in charge of all scouts on the aircraft then issued capsules to all the scouts who wanted them for air sickness.
