Kennedy Faces Prospect of Decisions On Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy faces the prospect of having to make some significant decisions in the next few weeks.
His leadership of the Western alliance is under severe challenge from French Premier de Gaulle. And United States policy of seeking to settle major problems with Russia while maintaining or strengthening the defenses of the non-Communist world may be moving once more onto shaky ground.
Adding to his worries is the break in Canadian-American relations which he developed last week over nuclear policy.
The contrast of conditions now and those which prevailed only three weeks ago gives evidence of sharp changes in direction of some major world forces.
Kennedy's success, whether it is necessary to undertake measures of restraint because of de Gaulle's open break with the Allies over the future economic, political and military organization of the Atlantic alliance.
Kennedy may have to decide also whether he wants to continue to try to pursue seriously disarmament negotiations with Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

BEHAVIOR PUZZLES

There are puzzling and worrisome aspects in Soviet behavior which seem to require at least a further assessment if not a complete re-examination of U.S. policy governing East-West relations.
The present range of Kennedy's foreign policy problems dates from the Cuban crisis last October, when he scored a major cold war victory by compelling Khrushchev to withdraw his nuclear missiles from Cuba without making it necessary for the U.S. to launch an attack.
Khrushchev's retreat was followed by his decision to shelve his plans for a Berlin summit with the U.S. and its allies.
The changing pattern of Washington - Moscow relations also brought a reversal in Khrushchev's position on nuclear testing and he offered to permit international inspection in order to get agreement with the U.S. and Britain on a test-ban treaty.

GOE MIXED REACTION

Kennedy's handling of the Cuban situation without consulting the Allies brought cries of resentment as well as admiration from Western capitals such as Paris and London. But, on the whole, Kennedy's cold war success brought him to the end of a very strong positive assessment as leader of the alliance—or so it seemed outwardly.

MEET MORE LOUDLY

Also, Kennedy's meeting with reporters at Palm Beach at New Year's time made clear his intention to assert vigorous U.S. leadership ever at the cost of dissent among U.S. allies, once again there were rumblings from Paris and London but this time the voices of objection were louder.
There was no doubt that Kennedy was trying to develop a more active and, when necessary, more independent line of American leadership. Washington officials know that the U.S. is less liked in friendly countries on many occasions but they felt it would be more respected and get more done.

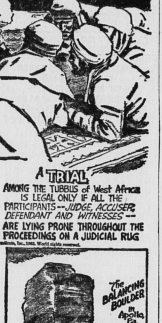
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to produce a result deeply disappointing to his disarmament hopes. On Friday, after a week or more of tugging and stalling in the nuclear test talks in New York Khrushchev broke off those talks.

The momentum of Kennedy's December exchange on nuclear testing was destroyed and one explanation suggested in high quarters here was that Khrushchev had decided to pull back from nuclear test agreement until he could see where the de Gaulle split with Kennedy and Macmillan is leading.

Kennedy's basic determination to push ahead with plans for a U.S.-Western European partnership already has been made. At the same time he would like to promote disarmament negotiations at least in the nuclear test control field with Russia. But his opportunities here are limited. It does not seem probable that Kennedy will be able to make many easy decisions.
