Prince County Hospital Annual Meeting Held

Hon. W. E. Darby was unanimously re-elected president of the board of trustees of the Prince County Hospital and Mr. M. L. Bradshaw as vice president at the annual meeting held last night in the Town Hall.

The following members of the board of trustees were also elected: George Hogg, William Mellich, Morley M. Bell, W. E. Smallman, Mrs. W. P. Callaghan, Austin Scales, Freetown, George Matthews, O'Leary, George Wilkinson, Springfield West.

The president in submitting his report to the meeting said that he was indeed pleased to see so many present at the meeting. "Our work is the care of the sick and the infirm, through the medium of institutional treatment," Mr. Darby said. "The methods, technique and internal routine are the paramount concern of the medical staff, the superintendent, nurses and technicians serving within its walls. This hospital is particularly fortunate in having in a small town professional men of the highest calibre serving on its staff. Our nursing staff has rendered signal service under trying conditions. We can only express our gratitude to them for their devotion to duty. We regret at this time to announce the resignation of our superintendent, Mrs. Margaret Boehrer. During the time she has been with us she has given unstintingly of her time and energies in promoting the interests of the institution. It is indeed regrettable that ill health compels her to leave. We hope she will retain her health and she will take our best wishes with her." The scope of the work performed may be indicated by the following review of hospitalization: Patients treated, 3,283; babies, 636; hospital days, 23,510; X-rays, 3,681; major operations, 368; minor operations, 876; plaster casts, 179; laboratory procedures, 9,780.

This is a tremendous volume of work in a sixty-bed hospital with only one operating room and one delivery room. Mr. Darby enumerated the various other work carried on, such as the operation of a nursing home under the supervision of Miss Margaret Doyle, which had graduated six nurses last year as newcomers to the noble profession of nursing. He paid splendid tribute to the superintendent and to the various clubs, the Okto Club and the Ladies Aid for the manner in which the interior of the hospital had been maintained in such marvellous shape.

The financial statement showed that the hospital had operated with a small surplus apart from the government grant. Mr. Darby continued, "with regard to the new hospital the work of construction is well under way with completely enclosed walls and roof and with the interior construction proceeding rapidly. We recently sold an issue of \$300,000 serial debentures bonds and I may say that I have been informed by the trust company that it has been completely subscribed. We hope that the building will be ready for occupancy early in 1951."

Tributes were paid to Mr. C. R. Rogers for many years president of the board, for the splendid work he had done in the past by Mr. M. L. Bradshaw, and to the late H. T. Holman and the late Mr. Bennet Kelly, by Dr. E. T. Tanton and Mr. J. E. Dalton.

Mr. Dalton moved that letters of appreciation be sent to the Ladies Aid and the Okto Club for the splendid work they have carried on each year in aid of the hospital. -S.

Continued from page 1 northern New Brunswick and Bay of Fundy ports, now connected only by a trip into the Atlantic outside Nova Scotia.

Specific Request The delegation asked specifically that the government not send the canal project to another Royal Commission, which would provoke further controversy and delay.

It laid the Maritimes wanted, in line with the recommendation of the 1931 Surveyor Commission that the proposal be renewed in the light of future conditions, to ask that the government "with all despatch, have plans and specifications prepared for a deep-draught canal and commence construction at the earliest possible date."

The brief recalled it now was almost 300 years since the Lieutenant (governor) of New France had recommended construction of the canal; 96 years since it was pledged at the Quebec pre-Confederation conference and 79 years since a Commission under Sir Hugh Allan had reported it was "inseparably connected with intercolonial trade."

Minister Speaks At Federation Meeting In S'ide

The Hon. C. C. Baker, Provincial Minister of Agriculture addressed the meeting of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture in Summerside last evening and dealt with a number of matters of interest to farmers, making particular reference to several resolutions which he had noted in the press, had been passed the evening before at the meeting of the Queen's County Federation.

Noting that a resolution had been passed urging establishment of a killing plant in the Province, Mr. Baker said he believed it would be an excellent thing but did not know just what could be done to bring it about. He suggested that the farmers get together and form a company and put up capital to make a plant available for the use of the public.

"It has got to be a tough job for Governments when with anything that is advanced the Government is expected to finance it," he said. He suggested that now the farmers are organizing to do things for themselves they could do something in this line as well.

Referring to a resolution which urged the Government to put its veterinary policy into operation, Mr. Baker said he could understand their impatience in this matter. After the veterinary assistance act was passed the department tried to get organized and get veterinarians to practice here.

"We thought it would be simple and we were prepared to pay high subsidies to get them," he said. So far it has been impossible to obtain any, but the department is conducting a search for any men that may be available. Subsidies of from two to three thousand dollars are being offered and this with what they could earn should be very lucrative.

Cutworm Menace The Minister said that there is an alarming situation for agriculture in this Province in the ravages of cut worms, particularly in the eastern sections. At first it was thought to be minor but it is really alarming. Acres and acres of grain and vegetables are being destroyed. Every available field man is working on it and financial assistance is being offered to try to control the pests.

In his opening remarks Mr. Baker said he was pleased to be present and was amazed at the turnout of people at the meeting. It shows that they are interested and want to better their condition. He pointed out, though, that conditions are "not

so bad here" and that "some of us are inclined to complain when we should be thankful to be living in a place like Prince Edward Island."

Referring to the main purpose of the meeting, that of setting up a potato marketing board, he said that to be successful there must be co-ordination between this board and similar boards in other Maritime Provinces and he suggested that "not too many" regulations be made at first. -S.
