



IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ELIZABETH MacLELLAN

—There passed to her eternal rest on Sunday, Feb. 3, Mrs. Elizabeth MacLellan, in her 89th year. She was the widow of the late Archibald MacLellan of Indian River, P. E. I., where she spent the most of her life.

In the summer of 1946, she moved to Montreal to pass her declining years with her daughter, Mrs. William MacDonald, and her granddaughter, Mrs. James Lennon. She was frequently visited during her last illness by her pastor, Rev. David MacDonald, who administered the last rites of the Catholic Church.

Her body rested at the Deslauriers funeral home in Ville St. Laurent, where numerous Mass intentions and floral tributes testified to the esteem of many friends.

On Wednesday, Feb. 6, the funeral cortege proceeded to St. Malachy's Church at Snowdon. Solemn high Mass of Requiem was sung by her son, Rev. Lawrence MacLellan, S.S.J., pastor of St. John the Baptist Church at Montserrat, P. E. I., assisted by her grandson, Rev. Rupert A. MacDonald, S.S.J., as deacon, and Rev. Francis Dalsey, S.S.J., as sub-deacon.

Present also in the sanctuary were Rev. John Britt, pastor of St. Malachy's; Rev. David MacDonald, pastor of Our Lady of Fatima parish; Rev. Richard Erley, S.S.J., pastor of St. Richard's parish Boston, and Rev. Edward Bowes, S.S.J.

The honorary pallbearers were John MacDonald, Raymond MacDonald, grandsons of the deceased, James Lennon, Walter Dwyer, Rodrick Cameron and Hugh Goedel. To mourn the loss of a beloved mother are her son, Rev. Laurence MacLellan, S.S.J., and four daughters, Mrs. Leonard MacDonald of Rumbold, Maine who was present, Mrs. Harold Martinson and Mrs. A. Dugger, both of San Francisco, and Mrs. William MacDonald of Ville St. Laurent, Que. Another son, Walter, predeceased her by several years.

In the presence of her sorrowing children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren, she was tenderly laid to rest in beautiful Cote des Neiges cemetery, on the slopes of Mount Royal, there to await the resurrection morn. May her soul rest in peace.
