WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court Monday ordered a new Lower Court hearing for Caryl Chessman, Los Angeles kidnap-rapist and death cell author. Chessman was sentenced more than seven years ago to die in San Quentin's gas chamber. His life was spared many times by last-minute stays of execution—most recently last July 15 when Justice Tom Clark granted him a stay pending high court action on a new appeal. Seven times before, however, the Supreme Court rejected various legal moves by Chessman and his lawyers.

After a brief discussion regarding the sidewalk and bridge, the meeting adjourned.
