New Canadian Wheat Deal Expected To Incite Yanks

WASHINGTON (CP) — The latest Canadian wheat deal with China is expected to increase the desire in the United States, already considerable, to grab some of the grain business with Communist countries.

Persistent speculation says President Johnson intends shortly to remove the main obstacle in sales to the Soviet Union and Soviet allies in Eastern Europe, namely, a requirement that half the grain sold to them must be carried in American ships.

Some Americans are opposed to removal of the 50-per-cent shipping requirement because they are opposed to anything that smacks of closer relations with the Soviet Union. The really stiff opposition to removal comes, however, from the maritime unions and perhaps the main thing staying Johnson's hand is the threat by longshoremen that they would refuse to handle any grain shipments to the Soviet Union.

Poor Growing Conditions Bring Increased Hardship

FROZEN FOOD PRODUCERS

As the result of meetings held in three different centres and a combined meeting of the committees named, a smaller committee meets with the Hon. Mr. MacRae to discuss problems arising out of this season's bad growing conditions.

Farmers are no strangers to taking losses and operating without profits. However, in this case the hardship is general and in some cases the losses very serious. More is involved than grower difficulty, unless some form of assistance is available plants may well have difficulty in finding producers who are willing to take the risk involved.

As some of the plants are in the process of getting established it would not be in the public interest to have unnecessary difficulty encountered.

Actually four different parties have considerable at stake in this connection — the growers, plant employees, plant management and the government representing the people of the province.

EGG PAYMENT

Egg producers may look forward to receiving 4.3 cents per dozen on up to 4,000 dozen eggs. This payment comes about as a result of the national average price for the last year being 29.7 cents per dozen substantially below the guaranteed support price of 34 cents.

ment, producers must be registered may do so by completing a form which may be obtained from egg grading stations. Egg producers are advised that early completion of their claims is indicated.

HUNTERS

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, judging from their publications, has categorized hunters versus poachers. Poachers are hunters who hunt outside the legal hunting seasons.

Trigger-traps have not been categorized by any of the provincial wildlife authorities. Are they hunters or poachers? They shoot each other, farmers, farmers' livestock and even the innocent city-folk who just enjoy walking in the woods.

The trigger-trap shoots instantly at anything that moves or makes a sound. During the 1964 deer hunting season a trigger-trap shot one of his own party who had climbed a tree. Hearing the sound of his friend up the tree the trigger-trap fired first and looked later.

Some of the trigger-trap victims are domestic farm animals which dared move or make a sound.

The trigger-traps are usually licensed by the Provincial Government. In contrast, the poacher is usually not licensed. He is a terrible offender in the eyes of game wardens. However, the poacher usually is so skilled at his trade that he does not shoot human beings nor farmers' domestic animals. If this were not so, human beings and domestic animals would be shot outside the official and legal hunting seasons.

Whether you regard the poacher as a worse offender than the trigger-trap, please remember — "alcohol and ammunition don't mix." Nevertheless, thousands of trigger-traps will be roaming the highways and woods again this year proving this simple rule with a number of human deaths as evidence.

BUTTER LEVELS

From a situation not so long ago when we were embarrassed with butter in Canada we seem now to be moving in the opposite direction. Stocks on hand as of October 1 are down 22 per cent from 157,000,000 pounds to 127,000,000 pounds compared with the same date a year ago. Production for the first nine months

of this year dropped 10,000,000 pounds.

WINTER FAIR

From an agricultural standpoint the Atlantic Winter Fair getting underway the last of week will probably be the month's most exciting and interesting event.

The Winter Fair in Halifax is making very definite progress and while it does not as yet have quite the same family atmosphere as the Amherst show yet it does seem to be developing a quite friendly quality.

Halifax is certainly one of our most progressive Atlantic cities its fine stores, hospitals, educational institutions and historic sites all add up to fine balance of attractions. Its great ocean port and important grain handling facilities make the city one of importance to the entire Canadian economy.

FOOD TRENDS
 A recent table illustrates the changes in food consumption between 1955-59 and 1959-62. In a general way with rising incomes more and more Canadians turn from a "bread and potatoes diet" to one featuring more expensive foods like meats, fruit and vegetables.

For instance the per capita consumption of fruit rose from 147 pounds to 237 and potatoes declined from 200 to 154 pounds. Poultry meat consumption more than doubled going from 14.6 to 29.6, cheese also doubled from 4 pounds to 8.5 but fluid milk declined from 418 to 346 being replaced by other forms of milk.

Although rising prosperity has resulted in a demand for the expensive foods it has not increased the capacity of the individual. The amount of food eaten per person is virtually unchanged today from the 1401 pounds per year average of the 1955-59 period.
