

# Reed, Bedard To Compete In Men's Tennis Finals

VANCOUVER (CP) — Whitney Reed completed a gruelling, successful defence of his top seeding Friday to join Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., in the men's final at the Canadian tennis championships.

Reed, from Alameda, Calif., took a 3-5, 7-5, 0-6, 6-4, 10-8 decision from Japan's Kosei Kamo in one of the hardest played matches seen on Vancouver.

Bedard, defending champion and ranking Canadian player, won easily over young Mike Crane of Berkeley, Calif., in the day's other semi-final, setting the

stage for a tough duel between the first seeded players among Canadians and non-Canadians. That final will be played this afternoon on the grass courts at the Vancouver Lawn Tennis and Badminton Club.

Kamo, ranked third here among the foreign entries, put up a spirited and agile defence despite progressive exhaustion under the hot sun.

Even Reed normally a relaxed player, seemed tired at the three-hour match and his end. Kamo had played three matches Thursday, including a four-hour, five-set contest when he eliminated Toronto's Don Fontana.

We mentioned about the previous win that we hoped Len had found the key to him and apparently he has. No doubt if he is campaigned on a mile track he will not close to 2:00. It is the turn of the horse because of the extreme stride he takes.

Our good friend Very Outway, Montreal, has very kindly sent us a score card of Blue Bonnet Raceway showing the winners of the different events. The second race of the program was won by Fleety Riddle, a 4-year-old by Van Ridden, owned by Rowland Newton-Robinson, Ont., and driven by Eric Smith, a young man whose home is Mount St. Joseph, P.E.I. The time was 2:08 1-5. A note on the card shows that he raced on the outside for over three-quarters of a mile and that makes his performance so much better. The Smith boys have several horses owned by the Rowland farm stable and we notice them from time to time winning and placing.

The Harness Horse reporting from Roosevelt Raceway has the following — The Miss America Trot worth \$25,100 — richest 2-year-old filly trot in the sports history, highlighted Thursday night's program at Roosevelt Raceway. Joe'Brien with the S.A. Camp's stable Colton Queen emerged the victor in 2:10 2-5 over a field of nine. The Rodney miss trailed in third most of the mile, moved to the outside at the three-quarters and won by half a length from Venture. The latter, with Bob Walker up, was in command at every pole except the half when Claudia's Song (Wanda) had the lead briefly on the outside. In the stretch driver Matora Hanover (J. Simpson) was moved into show position two lengths behind Venture.

At Vernon Downs Raceway last week a Pace, purse \$1,800, was won by Bomber Down with driver Allen, formerly of Halifax. Time, 2:03, the first quarter in 27. Vernon Downs is a five-eighths of a mile track with an eighth of a mile straightaway, and the world's record of 1:55 made by Adios Harry was stepped over that track in 1955. By the way, this wonderful pacer has been in retirement but we understand he has been treated by a veterinary and will likely have another try at the racing game.

Glancing over the winners at Blue Bonnets Raceway in the latest Harness Horse, we notice Bob Ryan winning a C Pace, purse \$1,200, with Joe Mac in 2:10 1-5. D. Smith of Mount Stewart won the D Pace, purse .600 with Betty Hal 8, in 2:10 3-5. She is owned by the Roland Farm. Fleety Riddle was also a winner the same night.

Even though baseball seems to be in for its most dismal season in recent history in Charlottetown, there are still quite a few players anxious to see it erect and back on its feet again. Apart from the junior team being sponsored by the Legion several senior players are still waiting for the word to turn out at Memorial Field and form an intermediate or senior nine.

It has long been a problem that is facing them at the moment is the lack of a backer. It takes quite a bit of money to support even a solid amateur aggregation, and thus far a source of financial supply for a baseball team has not yet been found.

Many of the players have turned to softball, but there are a good number left anxious to at least make an attempt to steer the game on the return path to its former stature. If some organization or individual is found to take the financial strain of balls, bats and other expenses, Charlottetown might just yet have an entry in the playoffs before the season has expired.

A solid nucleus of a team can be seen in these well known names: Kenny MacDonald, Jack Kane, Don MacLean, Kip Reidy, Jack Ready and Jack Burke, and there are plenty of others.

It has long been a topic of discussion wherever local baseball men have gathered as to why baseball has been on an almost steady downward plunge since its heyday just after World War II. Back some 10 years ago there was baseball played at Victoria Park four or five nights a week with doubleheaders on Sunday afternoon. Crowds were big—in comparison to what they have been for the last few years—and it was not unusual for six teams to be in competition.

In fact there were a few years when Charlottetown had two leagues in operation with three junior teams in one and three intermediate nines in the other. There was some overlapping, but in all there were about 75 players active. There were no all-star teams in the junior ranks either and the winner of the local league represented Charlottetown in the Island—and with luck—Maritime playdowns. Nines like the 17th RECC, Knights of Columbus, Aces and Kinsmen sometimes did mighty well, despite the fact that they were usually facing all-star squads from other centres.

# Olmstead Sentenced To 6 Months, But Out On Bail

VANCOUVER (CP) — Hockey star Murray (Bert) Olmstead was released on \$1,000 bail Friday less than five hours after he was sentenced to six months in jail for what the magistrate termed a "brutal assault" on a West Vancouver man.

Chief Justice A. C. DesBrisay granted the bail pending the hearing of an appeal by Olmstead in Victoria Sept. 9.

Allan W. Mercer, Olmstead's counsel, said the Toronto Maple Leafs player will return to his farm at Scitpore, Sask., to harvest his crops pending the appeal.

The six-two, 180-pound player traded to Leafs last month from Montreal Canadiens, slumped in the dock when the sentence was passed.

What effect the term will have on his playing career was not immediately known.

Olmstead's lawyer, Alan W. Mercer, said there would be an appeal and he would ask that Olmstead be released on bail while it is pending so he can attend training camp next month and harvest the crop on his Scitpore, Sask., farm.
