MRS. FRANCIS LAWLESS

Ons January 23rd, 1950, Mrs. Francis Lawless passed away at her home in Kinkora. Formerly Emma O'Connor, she was born in Clinton and lived there until her marriage to Francis Lawless of Graham's Road. In 1919 their happy family of fourteen children was broken by the death within a short time of two of their young daughters, Pearl and Mary, during the flu epidemic. They moved to Kinkora in 1922 and soon made themselves one with the people in all community and church activities. Mrs. Lawless died in 1924, but Mrs. Lawless carried on the farming with her sons with that same cheerfulness with which she met all the events of life. Devoted to her family and home, she still found time to share with others, and her friendly manner made her everybody's friend. In her later years Mrs. Lawless was remarkable for the keen interest she retained not only in home and community matters but even in affairs of world-wide interest, so that she never seemed to grow old. It was therefore a great surprise when it was learned early in January that Mrs. Lawless had suffered a stroke. She lingered for a few weeks during which she was tenderly nursed by her daughter, Mrs. Agnes Kilmartin, R. N., and her other daughters who were able to be with her for her last days. Strengthened by the Last Sacraments of the Catholic Church, she died peacefully amid those for whom she lived—her children and grandchildren.

Emphatic correspondence was again sponsored by the Chapter and very successfully carried out. 28 Patriotic Calendars were placed in rooms of the High School and 10 were divided between the convent and St. Eleanor's Schools. The sum of \$82.50 was donated to the High School for the purpose of supplying Book Corners in the Primary Grades. Pictures of the Royal Family were presented to the High School, these were framed by the pupils of the Manual Training Class at the Chapter's expense. Money was donated to the Board of Education to place like pictures in the Rural Schools of Prince County.

As in other years a poppy wreath was placed at the Monument on Remembrance Day. Food valued at \$138.81 was sent to Britain. \$50 was sent to British and European Relief, \$75 to the Endowment Fund, and \$10 to the shipping fund.

Used clothing valued at \$304.78 and knitted and sewn garments valued at \$176.04 were sent to Britain.

The Regent, Miss Wanda Wyatt, represented the Chapter on the Citizenship Council; this had to do with the new Canadians and involved a great deal of work. She also attended the Social Service Conference at Dalvey and the Annual Meeting of the Red Cross, besides all the conferences and duties associated with the regular work of the Chapter. She also represented the Chapter in the School Broadcast and gave a talk in connection with the Home Economics Department.

Conveners' Reports Mrs. Strong, Convener of Family Welfare, represented the Chapter at the Blood Donors Clinic, X-Ray Clinic and Dental Clinic. Several members volunteered and worked at the Blood Donors Clinic.

The Echoes Secretary, Mrs. Morrison, and the Press Secretary, Mrs. MacCallum, did outstanding work in their reports to their papers.

The Councilors again took over the ways and means under the convener'ship of Mrs. Hopkins. Assets for the year amounted to \$1297.23, this included the balance of \$560.83 carried over from the previous year. Moneys were raised by membership fees, Tag Days, Marathon Bridges, sponsoring of the movie "Carnegie Hall," a Rummage sale, and a small amount in donations.

The Film Committee, under Mrs. Richard Hinton, has for some time been working to have better films for children shown at the local theatres.

Some new and unusual features marked the year. First, the receiving of a Scroll from the Department, National Defence, for the work of the Chapter during the war; Second, the Historical Show put on in Charlottetown in cooperation with the Charlottetown Chapter. This project was extremely successful and many favorable comments were expressed by the press and the people. Miss Carrie Holman and the Regent gave Radio Broadcasts in connection with this show.

Founder's Day Last, but not least, was the Commemoration of Founder's Day. The church service was held on Sunday morning February 13 at St. Mary's Church. The beautiful service, including the dedication of the new flag and the inspiring address of Archbishop Harrison, will long remain in the memories of those present. On the following Monday evening the Regent, Miss Wyatt, and her sister, Miss Dorothy, opened their beautiful home to the members and gave the welcome.

It is hoped she will not tire, but continue to inspire it to increasingly useful work for a long time. This can only be accomplished by the cheerful co-operation of the members.
