Georgetown Home And School Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Home and School Association was held in the Council Chambers on Thursday, June 1st, at 8:30 p.m. There were 22 members present. After the singing of "O Canada", the president, Mrs. Myrtle Babineau, welcomed the new members who were in attendance. She then called on the secretary to read the minutes of the preceding meeting. The minutes were approved and read. Mrs. Babineau then reported that the Singer Sewing Machine Co. intend to offer some courses in sewing and will announce their plans for these at a later date. Mrs. Neil Wight reported for the membership committee.

Mr. J. A. B. MacConnell reported on the progress being made in securing the water supply for the school. He stated that the pipeline from Griffin's pump had been uncovered at a point near the school and that it was in readiness to proceed with the work. The Sanitary Engineer, There was no report from the entertainment committee.

The president then reviewed the work of the organization since its formation and thanked the members who had been so cooperative in the various duties required of them. Kings County Branch Fish And Game Hold Meeting

The second meeting for the organization of the Kings County Branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Protective Association was held in Souris on Tuesday night, June 13th, presided over by the president, Mr. Cyril Johnston. This meeting was a follow-up of the first meeting held in Montague a few weeks ago, and was for the purpose of electing the six directors from the north section of the county. Mr. Stewart Jones, president of the provincial association outlined the history of the parent association, stating that some 33 years ago Souris had a branch organized in that locality. During the past few years, he said, it had become more apparent that county branches should be formed, and this had been brought to pass with the formation of one in King's County, the others having been completed some time ago. An all-out effort should be made to obtain as many members as possible, thereby giving the organization a greater influence in the making of decisions. The old executive is to retire within a short period, and a new one formed comprising members from the county branches.

Mr. P. McLellan urged everyone to support the Fish & Game Association which, he stated, could do much to solve many of the existing problems in the county. Mr. J. A. Rodd stated that if the organization fully represents the district, it is of considerable help to the department, since the views of such an organization are always taken under consideration. Mr. Graham Rogers said that Canada was in a serious condition owing to its depletion in forest resources, and necessarily in the loss of fishing areas. The loss, he felt, must be overcome through conservation, particularly of fish and game for the present and also for the future.

In continuing the same thought Mr. J. Frank Sterns stated that members could help in this conservation program through obeying the laws and reporting violations so as to ensure such sport for future generations. Mr. Jones said that any such report would be placed before the proper authorities, and summarily dealt with. Mr. Harold Shaw gave a summary of the formation of the Queen's County branch, stating that members of King's registered in the Queen's branch would be transferred.

Directors Appointed The following directors were then appointed: Morell, John McNeil were greatly enjoyed by all present. The thanks of the meeting were extended to Mr. Howard MacDonald who operated the projector. The question of school prizes arose and on motion by Mrs. Rita Wight, seconded by Mrs. S. Landry a prize of \$5.00 was offered for the pupil from Georgetown School making the highest mark in the entrance examinations. Motion carried. Last year this prize had been donated by Miss Rita Wight. Before closing the meeting, the president read the aims of the organization for the benefit of any new members present. The meeting then closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Teachers Study Group at Uigg

The teachers' study group was held in Uigg School, Friday, June 2nd. The president, Miss Finlayson, occupied the chair. Nine teachers were present, also two student teachers from the surrounding districts. The topics chosen for discussion were listed and all teachers took an active part in the discussions. The main interest centered around the standardized Grade Eight exams. These were thoroughly examined under the direction of Mr. A. A. Gilmore, who informed the teachers that this year's exams were slightly changed for the better. Other topics discussed were reading in the lower levels; the teacher's part in the improvement of school property; work certificates; school closings; grading; completion of records at the end of the year, and school libraries. The end of the year problem of pupils leaving before the end of the school year was partially solved by the teachers' decision to vary the time of the roll call.

Following a short discussion on the pollution of streams, a vote of thanks was extended to the Queen's County members, who had so generously given of their time to help in the formation of the King's County Branch. After the meeting had adjourned, films on fishing and the releasing of quail and pheasants were shown by Mr. Jones and Mr. Acorn.
