I.:—"Put into Queenstown, all well, to land captain and crew (14 men) of the barque Sofia, of London, abandoned yesterday in a sinking state; blowing strong S. W. gale; will proceed first opportunity." A NEW FOG WHISTLE.—During last summer the East Point Lighthouse was removed to the bill of the Cape—where it should have been placed when built first—and a fog whistle erected which can be heard, it is said, a distance of six or seven miles. The genial keeper of the light there and his assistant, can now make things lively round the Point whenever the fog comes in—lively enough to warn off from the treacherous reef any unfortunate Quebec or Phoenix that may be passing by. The contract for removing this Lighthouse and erecting the fog whistle, was performed by Mr. Bernard Creamer, a resident of the place, to the entire satisfaction, we believe, of the Department.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) THE EASTERN DIFFICULTY. A Warlike Situation! LONDON, Oct. 14. The hopes entertained last night of a peaceful settlement of the Roumelian question have been shattered this morning by the receipt of a despatch from Constantinople stating that the conference has formally declared that the Porte has disavowed the Bulgarian-Roumelian Union. Further news is awaited with considerable anxiety. The British Elections. LONDON, Oct. 14. Joseph Chamberlain, speaking at Trarbridge this morning, made a scathing attack upon G. J. Goschen. Chamberlain said that Gladstone was in excellent health and spirits, and awaiting the approaching Parliamentary Elections with confidence. Lord Salisbury, the speaker declared, had no definite programme (except the Disestablishment of the Church which the coming parliament would not deal with). Opinions of the Press. LONDON, Oct. 14. The Standard this morning says the situation in the East has become more cloudy within the last 48 hours. The problem now for Bismarck is how to settle the pending difficulty so as to prevent Russia and Austria from fighting. If the latter insist upon Status quo or to force Serbia to agree to it, Greece will be satisfied. Messages to the Porte. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 14. Count Corti, the Italian Ambassador, and the President of the Roumelian Conference of Ambassadors, have sent their respective Dragomans to inform the Porte that they had agreed to condone the violation of the Berlin Treaty by the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia, and that they approved of the pacific attitude of the Porte. Patriotic Spirit in Greece. ATHENS, Oct. 14. The Minister of the Interior has received a telegram from King George in which the King thanks his subjects for their patriotic sentiments. Students here are appealing to students throughout Europe to raise their voices against the injustice done the Greek nationality through the Bulgarian union. Aquatic. TROY, N. Y., Oct. 15. Teemer arrived to-night and will immediately go into training for his race with Hanlan at Pleasant Island on October 26th. Everything indicates that the postponed double scull race between Courtney and Conley, and Hanlan and Lee, will take place to-morrow. There is little or no betting. Ohio Elections. CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 14. Returns at 11 p. m. give the State to Foraker beyond any cavil, and also show a Republican majority in the General Assembly on a joint ballot, unless Hamilton county should be Democratic. The general opinion is that the Legislature will be Republican by a good winning majority. Steamer News. CORK, Oct. 14. A four-masted steamer has been sighted from Galley Head, County Cork, having in tow a three-masted vessel, which is supposed to be the overdue steamer Sidonian, which sailed from New York, Sept. 19, for Genoa and Leghorn. The Munster Bank. DUBLIN, Oct. 14. The directors of the Munster Bank, which failed some time ago, announce that on Monday next they will open the head office of the institution in Cork, two branches in Dublin, and branches in Limerick and other towns. Fighting in Peru. LIMA, Oct. 14. It is reported that heavy fighting has taken place at Caganaica, between Munster and the Government troops. Lacey has endeavored to impose a tax of \$12,000 on the Province of Canta, but failed to obtain it. Boycotting a Line of Steamers. CORK, Oct. 14. At a meeting of cattlemen here to-day, Mr. O'Connor read a telegram from New York dealers, saying they would not purchase goods carried by the Cork Packet Company. War Imminent. BELGRADE, Oct. 14. The rumor prevails here that King Milan is about to issue a proclamation of war. It is said that troops are advancing from Nissa toward Bulgarian, Macedonia and old Serbian frontiers. A Patriotic Archbishop. ATHENS, Oct. 14. The Archbishop of Zante offers to devote his whole stipend to the national cause. A Peace Counsellor. BELGRADE, Oct. 14. The German Minister has started for Nissa to counsel peace.

Turkey Preparing for War.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 14. Great activity prevails in military circles throughout Turkey. Troops are being hastily armed and equipped for immediate service. A Fatal Fire. OAKLAND, CAL., Oct. 14. A fire broke out in a Chinese laundry, on the corner of Seventh and Market Streets, and five Chinamen were burned to death. Cessation of Operations. VALPARAISO, Oct. 14. The cessation of the operation of the Ito Chilean and Franco-Chilian arbitration tribunal is causing comment. Death of Josh Billings. MONTEREY, CAL., Oct. 14. A. W. Shaw, the American humorist, "Josh Billings," died at 10 o'clock this morning of apoplexy. Fatal Railway Collision. VALPARAISO, Oct. 14.
