Notes and Comments.

We are pleased to note that the St. pendiary Magistrate is again receiving subscriptions for the generous purpose of providing a good Christmas dinner to poor families in Charlottetown.

St. John Telegraph: The Charlottetown Council have unanimously resolved against the imprisonment of a woman for violating the Scott Act.

A few days ago the St. John Telegraph stated that the expenditure of \$5,714 "in delegations to Ottawa" was "a costly reflection upon Sir John Macdonald's Government."

Victoria, B. C., is prospering like the rest. The Colonist states that its white population is now 20,000, and that there are enough Chinese and Indians to bring the population up to 25,000.

And the growth has not ceased by any means. The influx is continually going on, and as we have seen, Victoria has been obliged to enlarge its bounds and to increase the number of its dwellings to make room for its increased population.

This is cheering, for Victoria's advantages are many and great; and it is bound to grow.

Victoria, B. C., is contemplating a system of sewerage. In view of an undertaking so costly, the Colonist says:—

It is not enough that the Council that undertakes a work of such importance should be honest. Its members must also be intelligent and capable. Honest incapacity may do as much harm as dishonest ability.

Herein lies a hint for the ratepayers of Charlottetown. The Council that carries a sewerage by-law must have the confidence of the ratepayers. Let them measure by taken to have the "best men" elected to fill the seats soon to be made vacant in the City Council.

A St. John (N. B.) correspondent of THE EXAMINER calls attention to the following quotation from a letter of the Rev. D. Davies Moore to the Provincial Wesleyan, and asks, "Can this be true?"

In this Province of Prince Edward Island drunkenness is frightfully on the increase. At least three hundred low taverns are secretly dealing out "vitriol madness" in Charlottetown. The plague is spreading throughout the country with the rapidity and virulence of small-pox.

That drinking and drunkenness have been for several years on the increase in Charlottetown and throughout the Province, is undoubtedly true. But we incline to the opinion that the Rev. D. D. Moore's picture is overdrawn. The editor of the Island Guardian, and denouncer of Father Strubbe will, perhaps, be able to say how far wrong the rev. gentleman is.

Recently, we have been pleased to imagine that drinking was slightly on the decrease. There was, certainly, in Charlottetown, a notable falling off in the number of drinking men subsequent to the delivery of Father Strubbe's temperance sermon. We agree with the Rev. D. D. Moore that an "earnest forward move" is much to be desired. The Scott Act, and strong sympathizers with the liquor dealers in the City Council,—this combination is not likely to promote temperance in Charlottetown.

Horse Notes.

Among a lot of colts taken to California by Sam Caton, who will winter them there, is a weanling filly out of Noontide, 2.20, her sire being Bell Boy, 2.19 1/2 as a three-year-old.

F. H. Briggs, an enterprising Maine breeder who is now on a visit to California, has purchased the two-year-old stallion Warren, a full brother of Sunol, 2.10, and will bring him to Maine.

The news comes from England that \$80,000 has been refused for the two-year-old filly Riviera that won ten races out of the thirteen in which she started this season.

The latest reported offer of a fortune for a trotting colt comes from Pennsylvania, and is nothing less than the statement that \$36,000 has been refused for the yearling colt Electric Bell, owned by Miller & Sibley, and a full brother to their stallion, St. Bell, being by Electioneer, dam Beautiful Bells.

Mares by Rysdyk's Hambletonian are now the dams of sixty-one 2.30 or better trotters, this being by far a better showing than is made by the daughters of any other horse. Ten years ago it was a common saying among the opponents of the Hambletonian blood that while the sons of the old horse were getting trotters his daughters were not doing anything in the line of producing speed.

It is generally understood that Maud S. will be placed in training next season with a view to lowering her present record of 2.08 1/2, which stands at the head of the list. Since Mr. Bonner purchased Sunol and went to California to look at the filly he has been much impressed with the ability of Marvin, and unless a change in the present plans is made, Maud S. will be sent to California in the spring, consigned to Marvin's care.
