6 Killed Aboard British Cruiser

LONDON, July 9-(CP)-The Admiralty announced today that the British cruiser, operating off Cape Verde, was struck by a shell from a shore battery. Five men were killed outright and another died of wounds, the Admiralty reported. The cruiser was not materially damaged. The Jamaica an 8,000-ton vessel of the Fiji class, mounts nine 6-inch guns, 26 anti-aircraft weapons and six two-inch torpedo tubes. Five of the dead were soldiers. The Admiralty did not disclose why soldiers were on the cruiser. The Press Association said it is likely the soldiers were taken aboard at Hong Kong for a cruise before the fighting in Korea started, and that they could not be landed before the Jamaica was ordered into action.

placed the North Korean offensive at Chou, 12 miles south of Chonan and 15 miles north of the Kurrier. The British, a natural defence line.
During July 8, the enemy stepped up his attempts to break through defences in the Chonan sector, headquarters said. The effort cost the enemy 40 tanks destroyed through Allied air strikes, but the momentum of the Communist offensive "has not faltered," the communique said. (Air Force and field dispatches dated Saturday claimed 40 tanks had been knocked out, while an army spokesman in Korea said Sunday that 17 more tanks had been destroyed, making a total of 57, barring probably duplications.)

On the eastern coast of the Peninsula, due east of Chonan, a North Korean detachment of 120 men seized the port town of Uchih, the communique reported. The fluid fighting front, on the basis of front-line and Tokyo information, extended from the Chonan area east and northeast about 60 miles to Chechon, which fell to the invaders. At Chungju, 45 miles east of Chonan and some 20 miles southwest of Chechon, fighting still was in progress. But Chungju, a road-and-rail junction held by South Korean forces, was in danger of being flanked. The communique said continuous air strikes should reduce the flanking threat which exists. Improved weather conditions Saturday allowed American planes to thunder back into action. More than 100 American and Australian fighters labored North Korean communication lines, strafed at low level with rockets and machine-guns blazing. Their bag included four tanks, 32 trucks, 10 miscellaneous vehicles and four artillery pieces. One locomotive and 12 boxcars were knocked out, while four oil storage tanks were destroyed. They flew 126 sorties. (Moscow radio put out a report, attributed to North Korean army headquarters, that 60 American officers and men have been captured and 12 planes, including some B-29 bombers, shot down, said a Reuters dispatch from London.)

Burma's Concern Mounts As Chinese Manoeuvre

RANGOON, July 9-(AP)-Burmese eyes are looking thoughtfully north at the faintly outlined Sino-Burma border where Chinese Communist forces have pressed close to Burmese territory. Officially, there is no great concern, because Burmese Government officials say they do not believe China's Communists will violate the sanctity of independent Burma. Nevertheless, the nearness to this country of undefined elements and the increasing forages into Burmese lands by bands of "bandits" make the average Burmese citizen anxious about the future.

What worries him is the comment by former minister E Maung when the armies of Mao Tse-tung were overrunning Nationalist China last year. E Maung, trying to scotch heightening alarm that Burma might be the next Communist target, insisted there was no need to worry about the Chinese Reds.

He contended that the Chinese Communists would have to straighten out their own affairs before turning elsewhere. He said this would take at least a year. Citizens here remember the year now is almost up and nothing has happened to the Communists. Report, not denied, that Communists have entered North Burma near the Kachin state, are not quieting their fears.

Latest reports of Chinese Communist activity just across the border say 2,000 troops commanded by a Red general, Liu Wang-Cheng, have marched from Kungming, capital of Yunnan Province, to Lungling, 90 miles from the Sino-Burma border, ostensibly to round up Nationalists masquerading as Red Army units. The reports said these had raided several villages close to the frontier.

Neutrals say the move brings the Communists within easy reach of Burmese Reds known to be soliciting their aid in a bid for power here, two high ranking members of the Burmese White Flag (Stalinist) Party are said to be in Communist China.

Independents do not believe a Communist invasion threatens Burma immediately. They also scoff at the chances of Burmese Reds obtaining any material assistance from north of the border. But they do question seriously Burma's ability to halt an onslaught if one should be made, despite Government claims that the border is "strongly defended."
