South was unquestionably "pushing" when he jumped to six clubs over his partner's not-too-encouraging three hearts, but success is powerful justification for many peccadilloes!
West selected what seemed to be his safest lead, the spade nine. Dummy played low and East, recognizing the lead as top of nothing, properly refused to sacrifice his king. South won with the spade queen and cashed his three top trumps, naturally hoping to drop the jack. East, however, discarded a heart on the third round.
Now that South knew he would have to lose a trump trick, prospects were bad, but South kept going. He cashed the spade ace, then took the heart finesse. The queen holding, he led the spade jack though East for the marked finesse. East, trying to conceal that he held the king, played low, but South simply discarded a diamond.
Now the heart ace was cashed and a heart was ruffed, eliminating West's cards in that suit. Finally, declarer threw West in with his trump, and having nothing left but diamonds, West had to lead up to South's major tenace.
South played the hand excellently by refusing to take the diamond finesse, maneuvering instead for the end-play against West. It is worth observing however, that if East had covered the spade jack to prevent the immediate discard of a diamond, he would have stopped declarer dead in his tracks!
