European News.

The foreign ambassadors at Constanti-
nople have presented a collective note
to the Porte demanding the execution of
the assassins of the Russian Colonel
Commeraoff.

The King of Spain has conferred on
Captain General Blanco the Grand Cross
of the Royal and Military Order of San
Fernando for his speedy suppression of
the second insurrection in Cuba.

A despatch from Madrid to the *News*
says the liberals view with much mis-
apprehension the large body of religious
orders settling in Spain. They point
out that society contains sufficient ele-
ments of clericalism and intolerance al-
ready.

M. de Baudry de'Asson has sent a
challenge to M. Gambetta, who, as
President of the French Chamber of
Deputies, was obliged to reprimand and
temporarily expel him from the Cham-
ber on account of his violent and unpar-
liamentary language.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says
that General Melikoff's significant hints
to the members of the municipality has
had its intended effect with the grain
merchants of that city, who have
promptly announced a reduction of
twenty per cent in the price of rye flour.
On 'Change the stocks of corn stored
in the city are sufficient for ordinary
requirements for two years and a half.

Particulars from Agram, in Croatia,
concerning the earthquake which oc-
curred there on Tuesday, state that 200
houses and two churches were irrepar-
ably damaged. Part of the Cathedral
must be rebuilt. The palace and coun-
try seat of the Cardinal Archbishop, the
government school and a cigar manu-
factory were half destroyed. Buildings
within a radius of fourteen miles were
terribly damaged.
