### Canadian Investors Asked To Boycott U.S. Concerns

OTTAWA (CP) — Finance Minister Sharp has asked Canadian investors to put their money into Canadian development and to boycott securities issued by U.S. corporations overseas.

He said the effect of current U.S. guidelines on American foreign investment may be to put undue pressures on the Canadian capital market. Canada normally isn't able to finance its own capital needs.

Officials said the minister's request is aimed at so-called new off-shore American bond and other capital issues.

One of the American guidelines is to encourage American corporations to raise foreign money to finance their foreign operations rather than draw dollars from the United States.

This has had its main effect in Europe, where U.S.-owned subsidiaries now are being encouraged by Washington to raise European funds — mainly European — held U.S. dollars — on European capital markets.

But there are indications the European capital markets can't supply all the need, and Mr. Sharp's announcement in the Commons Wednesday was mainly designed to head off the promotion in Canada of sales of foreign issues in U.S. of Canadian dollars to raise funds for use in third countries.

Officials know of no major U.S. off-shore issues so far sold in volume in Canada. But there have been inquiries of the Bank of Canada and the finance department as to how authorities here would react to such sales.
