In Honor to Mr. R. Harris, R. C. A.

Hon. Mr. Laurier, in the House of Commons yesterday, presented the petition of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts, recommending that the commission for painting the picture commemorating the Confederation of the Provinces of the Dominion be given to Mr. Robert Harris, R. C. A. Sir John McDonald agreed with the prayer of the petition.

Public Works.

Sir Hector Langevin yesterday laid on the table of the House of Commons a report of the Public Works from 1863 up to the present.

Rising in Zululand.

A despatch from Cape Town reports that a serious rising took place in Zululand a few days ago, but the party was suppressed by the troops.

Execution of Joe Brady.

Joe Brady was yesterday executed for murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke. A vast assemblage witnessed the execution. No disturbance followed.

Germany and Madagascar.

A treaty has been signed between Germany and Madagascar.

M. Waddington's Mission.

It is announced that the Mission of M. Waddington, French Minister to Berlin, is to assure Germany of the peaceful policy of France towards her.

Telegraph Notes.

Ven. William Lee, D. D., arch deacon of Dublin, is dead.

Sir Thomas Bernard, grandson of the last British Governor of Massachusetts, is dead.

It is stated that M. Waddington has a political mission to Berlin, where he is now stopping en route to Moscow.

The Hygienic Exhibition was formally opened at Berlin, on the 13th inst., by the Crown Prince Frederick William.

Eight hundred emigrants, assisted by the Government and Mr. Tuke's committee, embarked at Galway, for Boston, on Saturday.

The heads of 150 Shin-Warris have been brought to the Ameer, at Jellalabad, on the 13th, and been exposed on gates by his orders.

Irish people of Liverpool arranged for the saying of masses on Monday for the repose of the soul of Joe Brady, who was hanged in Dublin on that day.

The Japanese Government has proposed to China that they establish a joint protectorate over Corea. China, however, is not inclined to accept the proposition.

John Dillon, Irish ex-Member of Parliament, has returned from Naples with health much improved. Despite entreaties he refused to enter Parliament at present.

Prince Bismarck is becoming daily more emaciated and physicians have informed him the worst may happen if he does not abandon all State work for the present.

Mrs. Hannah Simpson Grant, mother of ex-President U. S. Grant, died suddenly at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Corbin, Jersey City Heights, on the 11th. Mrs. Grant's age was 94.

The Dean of Westminster has granted a request for permission to place a bust of the poet Coleridge in Westminster Abbey. An American admirer of Coleridge's works is to bare the cost of the work.

Mr. Childers, Chancellor of the Exchequer, stated in the Commons, on the 11th, that the Government would consider, during the present year, the question of permitting the growing of tobacco in the United Kingdom.

Good authorities now state that the wheat crop will be the greatest California has ever had, and present indications possibly make it the banner State. It is calculated that 11,500,000 tons will be reported next year.

Wm. Connors, aged 26 years, who shot and killed two men and cut two others, during a drunken quarrel at Glenmary, Tenn., on the 13th, was lynched. After being hanged his body was riddled with bullets by coal miners.

A passenger train on the Pennsboro and Harrisville railroad was precipitated into Hughes's river, Virginia, on the 13th, by the giving way of a bridge. None of the passengers were injured, but Frank Foster, conductor, and W. H. King, engineer, are supposed to have been killed. The train fell 15 feet.

The Dutch steamer "Leerdam," at New York, from Amsterdam, on the 13th, landed the captain, wife and crew of twelve, of the Norwegian barque "Inga," from Grennock for Quebec, coal laden, abandoned on the 6th inst. The captain of the "Inga" reports that his vessel struck on a big fish, April 10, and began to leak badly. She became unmanageable in the stormy weather which followed. The rescue by the "Leerdam" was made in heavy weather, and with great difficulty and danger.

A destructive cyclone swept across the southern part of Kansas city shortly after 5 o'clock on the 13th, unroofing and demolishing buildings for a distance of two miles, the track of the storm ranging from half a block to two blocks in width. A number of persons were injured and some fatalities are reported, but the loss of life is probably not so great as might be expected in view of the extent of the destruction of property. Nothing definite can be given, but the loss of property is estimated at hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The total loss of life by the "Grappler" disaster on the coast of British Columbia, is seventy-five.
