WEST QUEEN'S.

The Liberal-Conservative convention held yesterday nominated W. S. Stewart, Esq., Q. C., of Charlottetown, as the Opposition candidate for the representation of West Queen's in the House of Commons.

W. E. Dawson, Esq., was the only other gentleman put in nomination. The result of the ballot having been declared, the nomination of Mr. Stewart was made unanimous.

Messrs Stewart and Dawson are both gentlemen of high ability and character in their several spheres. The satisfactory manner in which Mr. Dawson had, for several years, filled the office of Mayor of Charlottetown and performed various other public duties, made his nomination popular in Charlottetown; and it is creditable to his supporters that the result of the ballot having shown that the Liberal-Conservatives of the riding, as a whole, are in favor of Mr. Stewart, they at once voted unanimously to make the latter gentleman's nomination unanimous.

Mr. Dawson himself has declared his satisfaction with the nomination and his intention to support the candidate selected.

That Mr. Stewart is eminently qualified to perform the responsible duties of representative of Queen's West in the House of Commons every one is assured, and only the more unscrupulous of the Government party will be found to deny. Every man who believes that the Laurier-Tarte combination has been false to the Liberal party, and false to the country, every man who believes that honest and able government is for the good of the country, will therefore have no doubt that his duty as a citizen is to work and vote for Mr. Stewart.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is pleasing to hear that our conductors, baggage men, brakemen and yardmasters have been notified that they have received an increase in their pay, the increase to date from the 1st July last.

—Sir Charles Tupper has set at rest the rumors which made him a candidate in Cumberland, Kingston and other constituencies. He told a reporter the other day that he was opposed to the policy of contesting two constituencies. He proposes to run again for Cape Breton if selected by the convention, and to run for no other county.

—The Chinese war is not without its touches of humor. Private letters state that at the bombardment of the Taku forts the crews of the Chinese torpedo boat destroyers in the river fled panic-stricken when the firing began; but after all was over they came back again to ask for the clothes they had left behind. The allies showed their appreciation of the situation by setting the Chinese to clean up the captured boats before giving them the clothes they begged for. Some Chinese gunboats in the river not only took no part in the battle, but used their powder next morning to join in the allies' salute to the newly arrived German admiral.

THE RIDING OF WEST QUEEN'S.

by Mr. C. C. Gardiner that Messrs. F. Perkins, C. E. McKinnon, R. B. Norton and Ernest Harris be scrutineers. The motion carried.

Mr. William Campbell, M. L. A., proposed Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., as a fit and proper person to represent the riding at the forthcoming election.

Mr. M. P. Hogan seconded the motion.

Mr. R. B. Norton nominated W. E. Dawson, Esq., as a fit and proper person to represent said riding.

Mr. A. A. McLean, Q. C. seconded the motion in favor of Mr. Dawson's nomination.

The nominations then closed and a ballot was taken. The ballot resulted as follows:—

Stewart..... 162

Dawson..... 36

Upon motion of Mr. R. B. Norton, seconded by Mr. James Paton and supported by Mr. Harrison Carvell, the nomination of Mr. Stewart was made unanimous.

The fact of his nomination was conveyed to Mr. Stewart by Messrs R. B. Norton and Harrison Carvell, by whom he was escorted to the hall amidst cheers.

Mr. Stewart, in a brief speech, thanked the convention for the honor they had done him. The nomination was not sought by him. He had waited upon Mr. Blake and Dr. S. R. Jenkins and offered them his support. But they both declined to offer for the riding, and after solicitation, he had consented to enter the contest. He had great respect for the gentleman who was nominated in opposition to him. He asked that those who supported that gentleman's nomination give him their support. He was at the service of the people, and was in the contest to win. He believed he would be elected if the party united in supporting him, as he felt sure they would. The Conservative party had a great leader in the person of Sir Charles Tupper, and he asked the people to do all in their power to return him. Mr. Stewart spoke at some length respecting the broken promises of the Laurier Administration, and referred to what had been done for this Province by the Conservatives, in the way of post office buildings, the Stanley, etc. The indications were that the Liberal-Conservative party would be triumphantly returned at the approaching election, and he felt sure that this Province would be found in line with the victors on election day.

Mr. Arthur Simpson, of Cavendish, moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this convention the present administration has conducted the affairs of Canada for the past four years with inefficiency and waste and with an utter disregard of their pre-election promises.

The resolution was seconded by Messrs A. C. Shaw and Thos. Reid and was unanimously adopted.

Mr. William Campbell, M. L. A., submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That this convention record its unwavering confidence in Sir Charles Tupper, the veteran statesman, whose courage and devotion to the public good have contributed so much to the formation and consolidation of the Canadian Confederation.

Mr. Joseph Wise, ex-M. L. A., seconded the motion, which was unanimously adopted.

Mr. M. P. Hogan submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That we firmly adhere to the principles which have always guided the Liberal-Conservative party, and which, while firmly maintaining a reasonable protection to native industries, discountenanced the creation of monopolies, which stood for a united empire and at the same time maintained the legislative independence of Canada, and which provided liberally for the development of the resources of the country without incurring a wasteful and corrupt expenditure.

Mr. William McLean seconded the resolution, and it was supported by Mr. William McKay, of New London. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The movers and seconders of the different resolutions supported them in brief speeches, and spoke highly of Mr.

Stewart whose success at the forthcoming election was assured.

Mr. Dawson also made a brief address, in the course of which he thanked those who supported him at the convention. He had not sought the nomination today. He never sought a nomination for anything either Civic, Provincial or Dominion. He was exceedingly thankful that he had not received the nomination today. He thought there was a fair prospect of the riding being carried, and trusted that on election day the Conservative candidate would be elected.

Mr. Peter McCourt thought the prospects good for the return of Mr. Stewart. He urged the electors to stand together in supporting him.

Upon motion of Mr. William Campbell, seconded by Mr. Arthur Simpson, Mr. Patrick Blake was re-elected President of the Liberal-Conservative Association for West Queen's. The motion carried unanimously.

Upon motion of Mr. C. C. Gardiner, seconded by Mr. S. W. Crabbe, Mr. Charles R. Smallwood was re-elected Secretary of the Association.

Senator Ferguson then spoke at some length, congratulating the convention upon the choice of candidate for the riding of West Queen's. He felt sure of the return of Mr. Stewart. He charged that the Liberal party had violated all their pre-election promises, and the righteous indignation of the people would be visited upon them on election day. The Liberal-Conservatives had fulfilled all their election promises. The prospects of the Conservative party are excellent. The feeling throughout Canada is that the Liberal-Conservative party will be returned. From every constituency in this province the reports are excellent. Some of the Liberals admit that the Conservatives will carry every constituency in the province. Senator Ferguson then spoke of the approaching visit of Sir Charles Tupper, who would address a monster meeting in the rink on the evening of the 4th of September. He felt sure that the Liberal-Conservatives would give their chief a reception that would gladden his heart and send him on his way rejoicing.

Mr. Blake then returned thanks for the honor done him in re-electing him President of the Association.

A vote of thanks was then tendered the chairman, and the meeting closed with cheers for the Queen, the candidate and Sir Charles Tupper.

DIED.

In this city yesterday afternoon, Margaret Jane McDonald, aged 37 years after a long and painful illness.

In the public schools of Baltimore the eyes of 53,067 pupils were examined by the tests ordinarily used, and the results are interesting and suggestive: 9,051 pupils were found to have such defective eyesight as to make school work unsafe; 53 per cent. of the children were not to be in the enjoyment of normal vision, but curiously enough the percentage of defective eyesight decreased with the age of the pupils. The report recommends yearly examinations of the eyes of the pupils' eyesight. The total percentage, nearly one-fifth of the total number examined, found to be in no condition to do school work at all, is a warning to parents and school authorities all over the country. It shows great negligence and ignorance on the part of parents, where the responsibility rests in the first place, and where periodical examinations of the pupils' eyesight by school authorities will place it at last.—Philadelphia Inquirer.
