In his talk with the diplomats, according to the account subsequently given out, Dulles made these major points:

1. Eisenhower is enthusiastic about starting Korean rehabilitation at the earliest possible moment to demonstrate what the free world can do in bettering the lives of the long-suffering Koreans. The president and Dulles intend to put U. S. troops in South Korea to work building roads, bridges, schools, hospitals and the like.

2. The United States hopes that the other friendly governments with forces in Korea will continue to keep them there. American military authorities say the Allies must keep on the alert against the possibility of some move by an enemy who has in no way relaxed his readiness for combat.

3. During his talks with Dulles, Dulles will negotiate key provisions of a United States-Korean security treaty but will keep the way open for later agreement on withdrawal of American troops from Korea if that becomes desirable. Some diplomats had been concerned lest the U. S. hamper an agreement with the Communists by committing itself how to maintain forces in Korea for a long time.

4. Rhine has a virtual obsession with the idea that the U.N. allies will lay down a hard-and-fast policy line on Korea without considering his views and interests. One of Dulles' purposes in making the trip to Seoul is to try to allay his fears.

Little Change Noted In Unemployment Situation

There has been no increase in the number of unemployed in the Queens and Kings County area in the past week and the total number of people drawing Unemployment insurance benefits seems to have stabilized at 350.

More than two hundred of these are residents of Charlottetown and vicinity, and of the entire two county total about one hundred are women.

A few of the claimants are workers who have returned from Upper Canada where layoffs have occurred in a few big plants. It is understood that employment is not as plentiful in some mainland towns as last summer, in such places as New Glasgow and Sydney. New Glasgow is said to have more people drawing Unemployment insurance benefits than at any time in the past several years.

In Charlottetown as distinct from Queens and Kings Counties, the situation seems to be slightly improved according to the local National Employment Office.

On the waterfront longshoremen have hopes of an extra busy year. The railway wharf at Souris now is undergoing a large scale extension, and may not be ready to handle potato boats this autumn, and the new wharf at Summerside may likewise be incomplete when the potato movement starts.

If these two shipping centres are not operating, Charlottetown and Georgetown will handle the diverted shipping according to workers on the local waterfront.

The Charlottetown pier and potato warehouse, both vastly enlarged and improved in the past few years, are well equipped to handle extra traffic. This port has also a number of experienced stevedores, well able to do an efficient job of loading any type of cargo.

Farm Jobs

Some farm jobs in Queens and Kings Counties still remain unutilized, and some of the farmers concerned are having difficulty harvesting the hay crop.

A small number of German farm workers which arrived here less than two months ago has been gradually reduced, by the enticement of higher wages in Upper Canada.

Continued from page 1 used to permit international Red Cross teams to enter Communist stockades. Apparently they still sought to keep Western eyes from combing over North Korean territory.

The Red Cross dispute, reminiscent of the two-year-long truce negotiations, caused the workers to delay until Tuesday their departure for the prison camps. Originally the mercy teams planned to start this morning, crossing the buffer zone between the opposing armies to carry comfort packages to men in their last hours of captivity.

Full-Scale Drill

The UN command called a full-scale drill today, involving thousands of men to test every joint in the pipeline that will speed homeward 12,763 Allied prisoners.

Mass preparations for the exchange sparked excitement at Munsan and overshadowed other work on the Korean armistice.

The actual exchange starts Wednesday when the first 400 Allied captives, including sick and wounded, arrive at Panmunjom for processing.

Peiping radio said the first batch of non-Korean prisoners were due at Kaesong today and a second group was leaving Pyoktong prison camp on the Manchurian border for the same destination.

The UN command has "stockpiled" Chinese and North Korean prisoners in holding points near Seoul and Munsan for delivery at the rate of 2,400 able-bodied and 360 sick and wounded daily.

every week or so, and the farmers losing their services have frequently been left in bad straits.

Some of the Dutch arrivals as well, quite often move to Central Canada after only a few months stop in this province.

In many cases the immigrants, German and Dutch alike, have relatives in Central or Western Canada, and this kinship plus higher wages, has too strong an appeal to be disregarded.

Every day the local Employment Office received inquiries about the prospects of work in Labrador, Baffin Island, and Greenland. The large companies engaged in the various construction jobs at these Northern points have announced that no further wholesale recruiting of men, will be carried out this summer.

Representatives of the companies are not expected to make any further visits to the Charlottetown National Employment Office this year. Certain phases of the work in the North are nearing completion and fewer men will be required henceforth to wind up the work.

There will be work in the North again next year, but the number of men required will be even less than at present.

N. B. Military Camp

Applicants for work both at the Charlottetown and Summerside offices frequently ask about the prospects of employment at the great military camp being built in New Brunswick. The Island Offices have not as yet received any orders for men for this job and it is very doubtful indeed if they ever will be asked to supply any workers.

Such New Brunswick cities and towns as St. John, Moncton, Fredericton, Woodstock, Chatham, and many rural areas will probably furnish all the men needed, and there is little likelihood, in the opinion of the local National Employment Office people that any men will be needed from the Island. It is only at such times as workers are in short supply on the Mainland, that the Island offices receive orders to obtain men for big projects in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Usually both provinces have enough men to fill any vacancies which occur, and at times more men than jobs.

Historian Of Skye Pioneers Here From B.C.

Mr. Malcolm A. MacQueen, the author of "Skye Pioneers", an accurate and most interesting account of the lives of the Selkirk settlers, and a book which he wrote as a hobby, is spending the summer with his brother Mr. Peter MacQueen, Orwell.

Mr. MacQueen, who will be the special speaker at the Thursday evening celebration of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the landing of the Scottish settlers at Belfast, was born at Orwell and is one of the illustrious sons of this community who has made his mark abroad.

After teaching school in the province for two years he attended Queens University and graduated in Law in 1903. Winnipeg was the place chosen by Mr. MacQueen to start his practise which he carried on successfully for twenty years. He later entered the investment and brokerage field in which he is at present engaged.

Malcolm A. MacQueen has been making a study of the genealogical background of the Scottish Clans for over thirty-five years and is one of the foremost authorities on this subject.

Taft Funeral At Noon Today

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Senator Robert A. Taft will be honored with a state funeral in the nation's capital at noon today.
