

United Church Y.P.U. Fall Rally Is Held At Tryon

The afternoon session opened by repeating the Y. P. U. purpose followed by a service of worship conducted by Travellers Rest Y. P. U. Those taking part were Eileen Stavert, Robert Marchbank, Catherine Poole. A very lovely solo was rendered by Maxine Campbell.

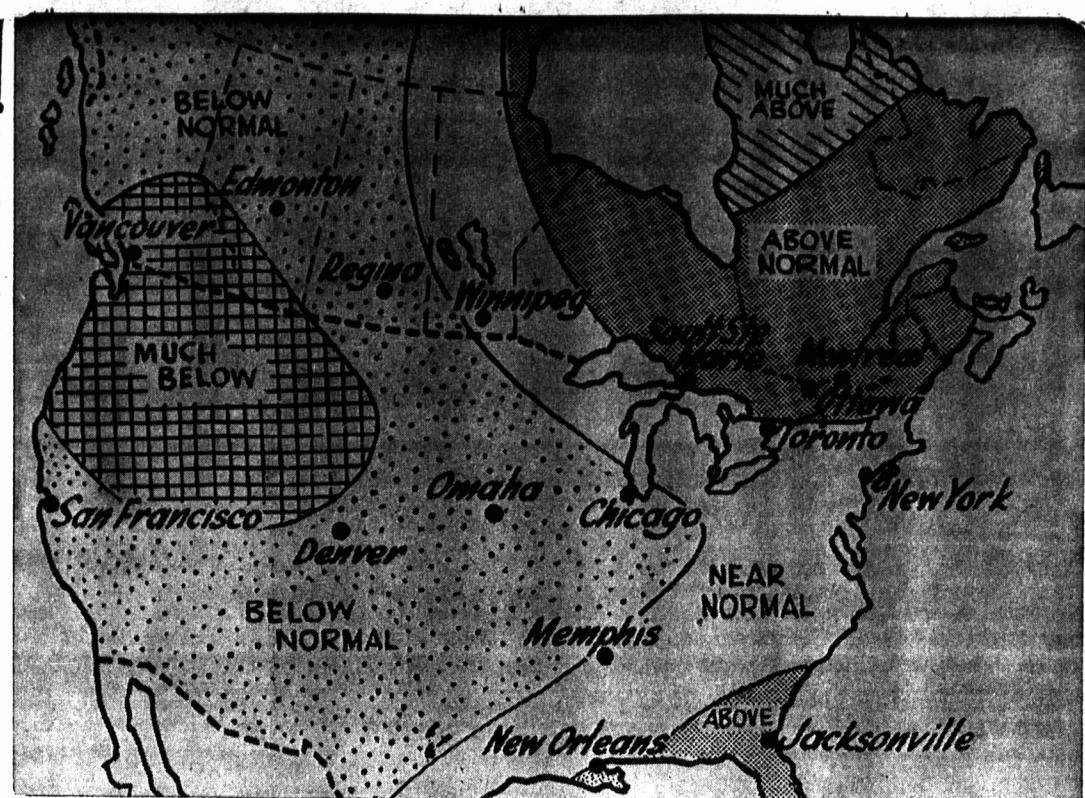

More Than 100 Shelter From Storm At Airport

Caught in the season's first snow storm — the worst November storm in many years — motorists by the score were left stranded in drifts as highways throughout the country were blocked by snow, leaving cars and trucks estimated from 100 to 150 buried in snow or skidded off the highway within an eight mile radius of Summerside. The occupants of many of these vehicles sought refuge in the nearest homes, but shelter and assistance for the greatest single group was provided by the commanding officer and personnel of R. C. A. F. Station Summerside where numbers in excess of 100 men, women and children were made warm and comfortable from some 30 cars and a large bus which were stuck between the airport road and St. Eleanor's — a distance of about one mile.

About 70 of these were collected from their vehicles by R. C. A. F. personnel and transported to the R. C. A. F. station in small groups in an R. C. A. F. ambulance.

High praise was voiced for Group Captain W. H. Swetman and the men under his command and several of these motorists contacted the Guardian to appreciatively describe the efforts made by the airman on behalf of the storm-stranded people. They told how they had been assisted from the snow drifts to the R. C. A. F. Station where warm shelter and sleeping quarters were provided, with breakfast made available in the morning, while Group Captain Swetman, assisted by station warrant officer MacAulay, organized a party of volunteers from the station personnel and proceeded to shovel out the snowed-in cars, and lift others out of the ditch onto the highway after first clearing the road with show removal equipment from the R. C. A. F. Station.

In the town of Summerside the municipal snow plow continued to work throughout the night, hampered somewhat by the many cars abandoned in snow filled streets. There were no plows at the Government Garage in Summerside as it is the custom to keep all the Government snow plows in Charlottetown during the summer for storage and repairs. A plow that started from Charlottetown yesterday morning reached Summerside about noon and continued on to open the main road right to Tignish. Other plows will leave Charlottetown for Prince Edward Island.

Manslaughter Charge In N.B. Shooting Case

NEWCASTLE, N. B. (CP)—John Kitchen, 20, has been charged with manslaughter in the death of George Girouard and is being held in the county jail pending a hearing at a date still to be set. Girouard was fatally wounded by a shotgun slug fired through the window of a Newcastle garage Oct. 26. Several witnesses at an inquest last week identified Kitchen as a man they saw carrying a firearm in the area the night of the shooting. "ANTARCTIC" TRUCE

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain, Chile and Argentina Monday renewed for another year the "antarctic truce," limiting the number of warships they will send to the disputed regions of the Antarctic, the foreign office announced. Under the truce, first signed in 1948, the three countries undertake not to send more naval units than is "customary" south of the 60th degree of latitude during the 1955-56 Antarctic season.
